


We also believe it's our job and our mission to inform the community. This is why we launched the **Crime Watch Newsletter** in 2020.



WELCOME

2020 CASES SOLVED

In 2020, the **Tip Line Program** received **9,069** tips which surpassed the last five-year (2015-2019) average of 7,861. These anonymous tipsters helped solve **374** cases and get **337** suspects behind bars in 2020. The maps below reflect the addresses of where the cases occurred (red pins) and where suspects were arrested (blue pins).



Sentences of Suspects Identified via Tip Line 2010-2017

In 2020, our Deputy Director, Nichole Christoph, sorted through eight years of cases solved by anonymous tipsters and categorized the outcomes of suspect sentencing. Highlights of her findings include:

- Our anonymous tipsters have helped our law enforcement partners detain and sentence 3,462 suspects.
- Anonymous tips solving murder cases have resulted in 48 life sentences and a combined total of 3,555 years in prison.
- 94% of suspects had a previous criminal history and 90% of the cases our anonymous tips helped solve resulted in prison or jail time.

HIGHLIGHTED CASES

FEBRUARY 2020

Illegal Dumping Tip Results in Large Drug Bust – Crime Stoppers received a tip about a man that dumped approximately 200 pounds of trash in a drainage ditch behind his home. When deputies arrived at the suspects home to execute a warrant, they discovered the suspect, and two small children were living his terrible conditions with drugs and guns in plain view. Over \$100,174 in illegal drugs were recovered from the home. This included over 750 grams of Heroin, 79 grams of Crystal Methamphetamine and 7 grams of Xanax.

JULY 2020

Serial Cell Phone Robbery Suspects – Between the dates of May 18th and June 22nd, who armed men entered nine different cell phone stores with the intent to rob the stores. In each case, the men would pose as normal customers and inquire about phone cases and/or screen protectors. The suspects would then produce a weapon forcing store personnel to open the money safe. Once the safes were open the men would take all the money and all available iPhones before fleeing the scene. In several cases, the suspect would also rob the employees of their personal keys, wallets, and cash.

An anonymous tip was received that provided the name and address of both suspects. Acting on the tip, the Houston Police Department attempted to pull over one of the suspects as he was leaving his house. He attempted to flee leading police on a high-speed chase. During the chase, the suspect drove on the wrong side of the road, rammed several police cars, and threw a gun out of the window. The suspect then drove back to his home and ran inside. Police were then able to take him into custody without further incident.

SEPTEMBER 2020

Suspect in the 2019 Murder of Trans Woman Caught – In September 2019, the victim and her roommate got into an argument because she would not take the suspect to the laundromat to wash clothes. The suspect became enraged and shot the victim eleven (11) times then fled the scene. Unfortunately, the victim did not survive her injuries. The suspect was quickly charged but remained at large hiding out in the Dallas area. One year later, Crime Stoppers received a tip that provided the location of the suspect. Based on the information the tipster provided, the suspect was arrested without further incident.

Safe Schools Start Here

The Safe School Institute is a FREE year-round one-stop center for all aspects of school safety. It works to keep schools safe by creating a proactive dialogue with students, parents, school staff and law enforcement about personal and school safety and by providing students with a safe and anonymous way to report tips and behavior that violates the student code of conduct on campus.

Since its inception in 1997, the Safe School Institute has educated over 1.2 million students in over 70 school districts in the Greater Houston Area and Texas.

Virtual School Safety Presentations

When the pandemic hit, the Safe School Institute team did not miss a beat and moved all safety presentations to a virtual platform. Our virtual presentations reached over 42,000 students and 15,000 educators.

Created a new interactive Cyber Safety Parent Packet

Provided videos, literature, safety tips, and conversation starters for parents covering Cyber Safety, Mental Health, and Human Trafficking - in partnership with the Safe Community Program.



Continued Statewide Training

Through virtual presentations, Safe School Institute continued training all Crime Stoppers organizations across the state of Texas on the vital role of reporting and other school safety related topics such as bullying and sexting.

SSI partnered with Region 4 Education Service Center through their "Getting Smart Virtually" initiative.














STATEWIDE EXPANSION

Safe Schools Start Here

On May 30, 2018, Governor Abbott unveiled his "School and Firearm Safety Action Plan" in response to the Santa Fe High School shooting. As the largest Crime Stoppers organization in the country, the Texas Criminal Justice Division asked Crime Stoppers of Houston to roll out our Safe School Program to as many Crime Stoppers organizations across the state – reaching approximately 1,800 school districts. In response, we are working with each Crime Stoppers organization across Texas to share all Tip Line resources and ensure each organization has what it needs to reach as many students as possible in their area.

We have hosted six statewide trainings in our building thus far, have reached 62 different groups and will continue to host quarterly trainings moving forward.

The **Safe Community Program (SCP)** identifies crime affecting our city and takes profound steps to prevent crime before it occurs. The program educates citizens through in-person and virtual presentations, trainings, community events, digital and written material.

2020 HIGHLIGHTS

Hosted 36 guest speakers in our 'Social Discussions while Social Distancing' series

The Safe Community Program invited guest speakers and partners to address COVID-19 related crime concerns such as Cyber Safety and domestic violence. Our team also created multiple resource guides and tip sheets to aid the community navigate COVID-19 safely.

Reached 15,277 parents and community members through 211 events and presentations in 2020

Due to the pandemic, our Safe Community Program got innovative with our programming. We offered outreach events and seminars such as self-defense classes, anti-terrorism seminars, and human trafficking events which were all held virtually.

Partnered with the Safe School Institute to produce engaging Safety Hot Topic Videos and Cyber Safety Conversations in Partnership with T-Mobile

VICTIM SERVICES & ADVOCACY PROGRAM

Promoting Safety, Healing and Justice

The Victim Services and Advocacy Program promotes safety, healing, justice and rights for crime victims and survivors. It is designed to act as an advocate on all stages of victimization and ensure crime victims and survivors have a voice in our criminal justice system.



The Victim Services and Advocacy Program provides the following to crime victims and survivors:

- Advocate for crime victims through all stages of victimization.
- Ensure crime victims and survivors in efforts to assist in the rebuilding of their lives.
- Assist in collaboration between law enforcement agencies, prosecutors, probation and parole departments, juvenile justice systems and social services.
- Accompany crime victims and survivors to Court and Parole Board hearings.
- Guide crime victims and survivors through media inquiries and speaking engagements.
- Refer crime victims and survivor to local, state-wide, and national victim assistance organizations.
- Work toward legislative improvements to enhance victims' rights and public safety.

2020 HIGHLIGHTS

Began 'Breaking Bond' series with Fox26 Houston

The Victim Services and Advocacy Program partnered with Fox26 Houston to bring awareness to the repeat release of violent felony offenders. In 2020, 7 segments were released. The series has continued into 2021.

Conducted over 150 media interviews to advocate for victims and survivors

Analyzed human trafficking related charges in Harris County from January 2018 to December 2020

ADVOCACY IN ACTION

In 2019, we noticed a trend in which many of the defendants charged with murder were released on multiple felony bonds, personal recognizance (PR) bonds, motion to revoke bond denied and bond forfeiture. Since then, we compiled a list of victims killed/murdered by defendants released on the above from 2018 through 2020 to include:

- 89 people total
- 51 homicides in 2020,
- 11 victims of domestic violence including
- 3 unborn children amongst the victims.








9 1976

The first Crime Stoppers launches in Albuquerque, New Mexico in response to an uptick in violent crime.

1980

The Exchange Club of Houston Downtown, including Dave Ward, establishes Crime Stoppers of Houston and our famed anonymous Tip Line number, 713-222-TIPS.

1980

The anonymous Tip Line receives 400 anonymous tips and leads to one felony arrest in its first week of operation.

1997

Launches the Safe School Program focused on educating students on how to use the Tip Line for anonymous reporting.

1998

Reached milestone of over \$3 million cash rewards paid to anonymous tipsters.

2013

Established the Safe Community Program dedicated to crime prevention across the greater Houston community and expanded the Safe School Program to include prevention.

2017

The Dave Ward Building opened its doors to the Houston community. The nearly 30,000 square foot facility is the first public safety, crime prevention facility of its kind. It is the only Crime Stoppers Headquarters in the world.

2018

The Safe School Program becomes the Safe School Institute, a one-stop shop for all things school safety.

2018

Rania Mankarious is named the first ever CEO of Crime Stoppers.
