In 2017, the non-profit opened the doors to the first-ever Crime Stoppers headquarters in the world. Focused on creating crime-fighting solutions, the organization recently expanded its Safe Community Program into an Institute that now includes a Victim Services & Advocacy Program, the Glenda Gordy Research Center, and The Balanced Voice podcast. Additionally, its Safe School Institute continues to provide critical school safety resources and trainings on both local and national platforms.

2021 was also a very special year because we were finally able to see our supporters, like many of you, in person at our annual Luncheon and Gala.

TIP LINE PROGRAM

Harris County and its surrounding regions have experienced an unprecedented increase in violent crime over the past couple of years. To make matters worse, violent criminals getting released on low or no bonds become repeat offenders and continue to add to the number of rising criminal activity. The Crime Stoppers' Tip Line is an invaluable resource to support overwhelmed law enforcement solve criminal cases, and to empower citizens to contribute to the fight against crime.

The Tip Line Program continues to be a national crime solving system and aims to equip and motivate all citizens to report crime. Through collaboration with more than 70 local and federal law enforcement agencies, the Tip Line has proven its success in solving and preventing crime in the Greater Houston Area.

The Tip Line offers cash rewards to anonymous citizens who provide tips to help solve unsolved crimes and locate wanted fugitives in the Greater Houston Area. Crime Stoppers may pay a cash reward of up to \$5,000 on all felony crimes that happen in the Greater Houston/Harris County area. The only requirement is you must report your tip directly to Crime Stoppers by calling (713) 222-TIPS (8477), going online to crime-stoppers. org or by using the Crime Stoppers mobile app.

Crime Stoppers has been serving Harris County for 41 years as the leading public safety organization in regards to bridging the gap between law enforcement and the community.



This is the primary reason we launched the Crime Watch Newsletter in 2021. In the newsletter we inform the community, highlight cases, discuss victim rights, school safety and other topical issues.

TIP LINE 2021 CASES SOLVED

In 2021, the Tip Line Program received **8,950 tips**. These anonymous tipsters helped solve **380 cases** and get **223 arrests**.

SENTENCES OF SUSPECTS IDENTIFIED VIA TIP LINE 2010-2021

In 2021, our Deputy Director, Nichole Christoph, sorted through **eight** years of cases solved by anonymous tipsters and categorized the outcomes of suspect sentencing. Highlights of her findings include:

- Our anonymous tipsters have helped our law enforcement partners detain and sentence 3,462 suspects.
- Anonymous tips solving murder cases have resulted in 48 life sentences and a combined total of 3,555 years in prison.
- 94% of suspects had a previous criminal history and 90% of the cases our anonymous tips helped solve resulted in prison or jail time.

TIP LINE HIGHLIGHTED CASES

- January 2021 Did He Do It for the 'Gram? An ATM repair man was working on a broken machine when he was approached by a male suspect. The suspect demanded the victim to get on the ground and not to look at him. The suspect then removed approximately \$17,000 from the ATM before fleeing the scene. A tipster contacted the tip line to report the suspect was making large purchases on Rodeo Drive in Los Angeles shortly after the robbery. Additionally, the suspect posted pictures on Instagram flashing large amounts of cash shortly after the robbery. Police were able to charge and arrest the suspect based on the tipster's information.
- February 2021 Forged Check Used to "Set Em Free" A local attorney received a phone call from "Set Em Free" bail bonds company to authenticate a check that had been presented for \$1,850 to post bond for a man in jail. The attorney reported that he did not issue that check and did not give anyone permission to use it. The suspect reportedly stole the check to bail her significant other out of jail for a domestic violence related charge. As part of the process, the suspect had to provide her id and social security card when she presented the check. The victim quickly identified the suspect as an employee of his law firm and that she used his rubber stamp signature on the check. Based on this information, the suspect was charged with forgery but remained at large until a tipster provided her location.
- July 2021 Young Mother Killed While Holding Son On July 1, 2021, the victim was preparing for her son's first birthday and was holding when her ex began arguing with her. The suspect produced a firearm and shot the victim who was holding the toddler. Prior to fleeing the scene, the suspect also shot the one-year-old boy in the lower leg. The toddler was transported to a hospital with non-life threating injuries. Sadly, the young mother did not survive her injuries. The suspect was out on seven felony bonds when this incident took place.
- August 2021 Road Rage After Astros Game On June 6, 2021, Paul Castro and his sons just left Minute Maid
 Park after watching an Astros game. While in traffic, a driver of another car got into a verbal altercation
 with the Castro's over letting cars into the lane of traffic and finger gestures were exchanged. The suspect
 then aggressively followed the Castro's onto the freeway. Mr. Castro attempted to elude the suspects then
 heard several gunshots and saw that the truck's back window shatter. Unfortunately, David Castro (17) was
 shot in the back of the head and didn't survive.
- Crime Stoppers of Houston conducted a press conference with David's grief-stricken family to plead for the public's assistance. A few days after the press conference, an anonymous tipster called the tip line and provided very detailed information regarding the suspect and incident that was not released to the media. The Houston Police Department was able to obtain a search warrant after verification of the tipster's information and the suspect was arrested.
- November 2021 New Employee Helped Themselves to the Safe On August 26, 2021, a local restaurant reported to police that an employee had taken money out of the safe. The manager told police that the suspect was a new employee that had only been working there for one week. The suspect was seen on surveillance cameras entering an office on the 26th and removing cash and placing it in his pocket on the way out. On the following day, the same suspect is seen again entering the office and removing an even larger wad of cash and exiting the office. Court records show that this suspect has been convicted of multiple thefts. Charges were immediately filed but the suspect remained at large until a tipster called in with his location. It is not known if the restaurant ran a criminal background check prior to hiring this repeat offender.
- December 2021 Victim Caught with Pants Down On June 7, 2021, an elderly victim in their truck was at a stop when they were approached by a female suspect. The suspect suggested that the two drive to a local motel and the victim agreed. The victim was sitting on the bed with their pants next to them. The suspect told the victim that she needed to use the restroom and walked towards the bathroom but quickly redirected. She grabbed the victim's pants, vehicle keys, and wallet as she ran to their vehicle. She got in and started the engine. Attempting to stop the suspect from stealing their truck, the victim ran out and grabbed the steering wheel. Their hand slipped off the steering wheel and they fell to the ground. The victim had to quickly move out of the way to avoid being hit by the suspect as she fled. A tipster provided information that resulted in the identification and arrest of the suspect.



SAFE SCHOOL INSTITUTE

SAFE SCHOOL INSTITUTE (SSI)

The Safe School Institute (SSI) is a one-stop center for all aspects of school safety. SSI keeps schools safe by creating a proactive dialogue with students, school staff and law enforcement about personal and school safety. The institute strives to reduce victimization, deter delinquency, and increase campus reporting through prevention-based presentations and trainings.

Since its inception in 1997, the Safe School Institute has evolved into a FREE, year-round program that has educated over 1.3 million students in 81 school districts in the Greater Houston Area, as well as Texas.

The Institute delivers all three levels of prevention: primary, secondary, and tertiary. We are committed to reaching our audience whenever they are able, whether it be during or outside of school hours, on campus or off-campus. Whatever their needs are, the Safe School Institute is available at no cost to provide a customized format that addresses those needs.

2021 HIGHLIGHTS

ACCOMPLISHMENTS ·····

- SSI became an approved facilitator with the Texas Education Agency (TEA) for Superintendent, School Board and Educator trainings for Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse, Neglect and Human Trafficking.
- SSI kicked off the 1st annual Child ID Kit Community service project, where 10 Harris County schools collectively assembled 3,500 kits for the SSI team to distribute to the community.
- SSI collaborated with former Harris County State District Judge Maria Jackson to bring vital legal information and strategies to our ongoing S.A.V.E webinars in partnership with the TEA and Spindletop Charities, Inc.

CONTENT CREATION

- SSI developed and produced Educator Safety tips and flow charts on Bullying / Cyberbullying, Child Abuse, Neglect and Human Trafficking, as well as Cyber Crimes and Teen Dating Violence disclosures, to create thoughtful and engaging questions and discussions to assist in situations concerning safety or emergencies.
- SSI created safety tips for the Tween Presentations on Bullying and Cyberbullying, Cyber Safety and Substance Use prevention.
- SSI created two new presentations: Substance Use Prevention Tween providing students in elementary school the strategies to handle peer pressure and ways to say no, and The Nexus between Social Media and Mental Health Teen assisting teenagers in implementing healthy strategies to balance school, life and social media.





2021 SIGNIFICANT SCHOOL CASES

JANUARY 2021

A Houston Area High school had a situation in the fall semester surrounding explicit content and relational safety. After this situation occurred, the counselor reached out to the Safe School Institute and had us present to their 9th-12th grade students on Teen Dating Violence to bring awareness around the topic but also laws, consequences and long term affects.

APRIL 2021

A Fort Bend area Middle School had us out to present on Cyber Safety. In between presentations, the education specialist was approached and told that after they had finished with the 6th grade and 7th grade presentation, there had been 4 disclosures about bullying and theft of student items on campus that they were able to solve and return the items back to the owner.

OCTOBER 2021

A Houston area Elementary School had us out to present on Bullying Prevention. The counselor then followed up with the education specialist who presented and made them aware of a bullying and harassment situation regarding a group of students in one of the grades. She reached out to make sure that she was following the proper protocol of reporting the bullying / harassment situation. This then lead the Safe School Institute to create Educator Flow charts to assists educators and professional safe in the school system when handling certain situations and what potential next steps are.







STATEWIDE EXPANSION


The **Statewide Training and Expansion Program** held a first quarter training in February 2021 and had 74 attendees. The second quarter training was held April 2021 and had 51 attendees. The third quarter training was held July 2021 and had 42 attendees. The fourth quarter training was held November 2021 and had 49 attendees.

BACKGROUND · · · · · · ·

On May 30, 2018, Governor Greg Abbott unveiled his multifaceted "School and Firearm Safety Action Plan" in response to the Santa Fe High School shooting that occurred on May 18, 2018. His Action Plan includes expanding campus Crime Stoppers programs statewide. As the largest Crime Stoppers organization in the country, the Texas Criminal Justice Division asked Crime Stoppers of Houston to roll out our Safe School Program to as many Crime Stoppers organizations across the state – reaching approximately 1,800 school districts.

In response, we are committed to sharing our program, training stakeholders, developing curriculum, and engaging the community so that every Crime Stoppers organization operating within the State of Texas can offer their local schools and their entire community the same life-saving tools and resources we have here.

To date, we have hosted **14 statewide trainings**. In 2018, we held our first quarterly training at our headquarters, followed by 6 more in-person quarterly trainings through February 2020. However, with the onset of COVID 19, we moved our trainings to a virtual platform for the remainder of 2020 through 2021. We've **reached 201 Crime Stoppers groups/affiliates within Texas**, 31 Crime Stoppers groups/affiliates from around the USA and internationally, and will continue to host quarterly trainings moving forward.

SAFE COMMUNITY PROGRAM*

The **Safe Community Program** has focused heavily on the rise in violent crime in Houston by hosting informational meetings about the ramifications of felony bond reform and the role of elected officials in Harris County. We have created a series of animation videos and a new civics presentation to explain what each official in our city and county is responsible for. **The Balanced Voice Podcast** completed seasons 2 and 3 in 2021, which included guest such as Matthew McConaughey, Tamron Hall, Dominique Sachse, Dr. Laura Berman, and many more.

The **Victim Services & Advocacy Program** appeared at the national CrimeCon Convention in Austin and was a featured speaker as well as a podcast guest on the Nancy Grace podcast. Andy Kahan, the director of the Victim Services & Advocacy Program, works with Randy Wallace on his FOX show, Breaking Bond, discussing the ramifications of felony bond reform and the toll it has taken on the citizens of Harris County. In addition, Parents of Murdered Children and Surviving Family Members of Homicide have resumed in-person at Crime Stoppers on the second Tuesday of every month.



*As of January 2022, the Safe Community Program has changed its name to the Safe Community Institute, encompassing the Safe Community Program, Victim Services program, The Balanced Voice Podcast and the Glenda Gordy Research Center, which launched in February 2022.



VICTIM SERVICES & ADVOCACY PROGRAM

The **Victim Services and Advocacy Program** promotes safety, healing, justice and rights for crime victims and survivors. It is designed to act as an advocate on all stages of victimization and ensure crime victims and survivors have a voice in our criminal justice system.

The Victim Services and Advocacy Program provides the following to crime victims and survivors:

- Advocate for crime victims through all stages of victimization.
- Assist crime victims and survivors in efforts to rebuild their lives.
- Assist in collaboration between law enforcement agencies, prosecutors, probation and parole departments, juvenile justice systems and social services.
- Accompany crime victims and survivors to Court and Parole Board hearings.

ADVOCACY IN ACTION

In 2019, we noticed a trend in which many of the defendants charged with murder were released on multiple felony bonds, personal recognizance (PR) bonds, motion to revoke bond denied and bond forfeiture. Since then, we compiled a list of victims killed/murdered by defendants released on the above from 2018 through 2021 to include:




