Established in the early 1980’s as solely a Tip Line Program, Crime Stoppers remains committed to its mission to solve and prevent serious crime in partnership with citizens, media and the criminal justice system, and now offers a robust public safety program that is reaching millions each year. In 2017, the non-profit opened the doors to the first-ever Crime Stoppers headquarters in the world. Focused on finding crime-fighting solutions, the organization’s Safe Community Institute now includes a Victim Services & Advocacy Program, the Glenda Gordy Research Center and The Balanced Voice Podcast. Additionally, its Safe School Institute continues to expand to provide critical school safety resources and trainings across the State of Texas.

LETTER FROM THE CEO



Hi Friends,

What another wonderful year filled with many accomplishments! Thank you all for your continued and steadfast support of Crime Stoppers of Houston. We would not be successful without our partners, board members, advisory board members, and donors and we are so grateful for your year-over-year support. In 2023, the annual Gala raised over \$1,000,000 for the third year and had its first-ever Presenting Sponsor. Thankfully, as the importance of the mission grows, so does our team. Crime Stoppers now has over 23 individuals working full-time, alongside our growing board of directors, on program growth and community service!

We couldn't be prouder of the work and our partners. Thank you all who support us and work alongside us! Here are a few of the things we have accomplished this past year, together:

- Our Tip Line, which accepts anonymous tips in over 22 languages, received the Productivity Award for Most Cases Cleared (2022).
- Our Safe School Institute (SSI) continues to grow and serve the entire state of Texas with a team now hitting the major cities in the state. Between January and December 2023, the Safe School team reached 128,145 students, 10,807 educators/school law enforcement, and 3,693 parents. Statewide, the team reached 30,477 students, 8,257 educators/school law enforcement, and 3,366 parents in just our first year of the statewide expansion. In conjunction with the Safe Community Institute, we created a sextortion and pornography guide for parents and their children, designed topical safety posters for K-12 schools to be used in tandem with prevention education, and created a "drugs in a snap" resource guide for middle and high school students. On the state level, we created a newsletter with over 300 school safety contacts from all over Texas and reached 54 new schools. Our partnership with the Texas Education Agency (TEA) has proven to be extremely helpful in building partnerships and relationships with school safety personnel across Texas. As the needs of the school community grow, so does the work of SSI and we thank you all!
- Our Safe Community Institute (SCI) also continued to thrive! This Institute, which houses the Safe Community Program, the Victim Services and Advocacy Program, The Balanced Voice Podcast, and The Glenda Gordy Research Center has done so much. The SCI team reached 209,024 community members through prevention education and potentially reached 2,755,822 community members through community outreach events. The Victim Services and Advocacy Program directly served 3,072 victims and recorded and submitted 12 Victim Impact Statement Videos to the Texas Board of Parole. The Glenda Gordy Research Center developed and maintained a database of over 6,000 lines of code and processed 48 million data points. In addition, the Balanced Voice Podcast released 26 episodes covering the most pressing, time-sensitive issues of the day and reached 1,941,957 people. We do all this, again, thanks to you!

Crime Stoppers of Houston has stayed true to its mission, never failing to show up and stand up for the public safety needs of the community. As the needs have grown and are ever-changing year over year, we have been thankful for the individuals who have joined us to offer us support. We stand together and work together and are thankful for the opportunity to do so!

We're here, committed to the mission and committed to the safety of our city and beyond.

The Tip Line Program continues to be a **crime solving system** and aims to equip and motivate all citizens to report crime. Through collaboration with more than 70 local and federal law enforcement agencies, the Tip Line has proven its success in solving and preventing crime in the Greater Houston Area.

HOW IT WORKS

The Tip Line offers cash rewards to anonymous citizens who provide tips to help solve unsolved crimes and locate wanted fugitives in the Greater Houston Area. Crime Stoppers may pay a cash reward of up to \$5,000 on all felony crimes that happen in the Greater Houston/Harris County area. The only requirement is you must report your tip directly to Crime Stoppers by calling (713) 222-TIPS (8477), going online to crime-stoppers.org or by using the Crime Stoppers mobile app.

THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Crime Stoppers may pay a cash reward of up to \$5,000 on all felony crimes that happen in the Greater Houston/Harris County area. Here are things you should know about our Tip Line:

-  To be eligible for a cash reward, you must report your tip directly to Crime Stoppers of Houston.
-  Crime Stoppers will never ask you for your name, phone number, address, or any other information that could identify you. We do not record phone calls or have caller ID. No one will know you called us unless you tell them.
-  Once you give us your tip, you will be given a code number. This is the only way Crime Stoppers can identify you. Crime Stoppers cannot call you with the status because we don't ask for your phone number. You need to remember this number and provide it when you call back to check the status of your tip.
-  When you call back with your code number, we will let you know if your tip helped law enforcement arrest or charge a felony suspect/fugitive. If it did, you may be eligible for a cash reward and will give you instructions on how to retrieve your cash reward. You will not be asked to show any ID.

VICTIM SERVICES AND ADVOCACY PROGRAM

The Victim Services and Advocacy Program promotes safety, healing, justice and rights for crime victims and survivors. It is designed to act as an advocate on all stages of victimization and ensure crime victims and survivors have a voice in our criminal justice system.

 In 2021, Crime Stoppers of Houston identified a major gap in post-conviction advocacy services. To meet that need, we established our first of its kind Victim Impact Video Project which provides victims the opportunity to record their story in video format and submit that video to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles so that their story can be heard at all future parole hearings whether they are there in person or not.

To date, we have created 32 Victim Impact Statement Videos - 20 in our first round of videos filmed in 2021, and an additional 12 this year in 2023. Of the videos that we have already filmed, several have been used in Parole Hearings across the State of Texas and in all cases that they were used, parole was denied. As the word spreads about this important project, our team has worked hard to create a scalable process.

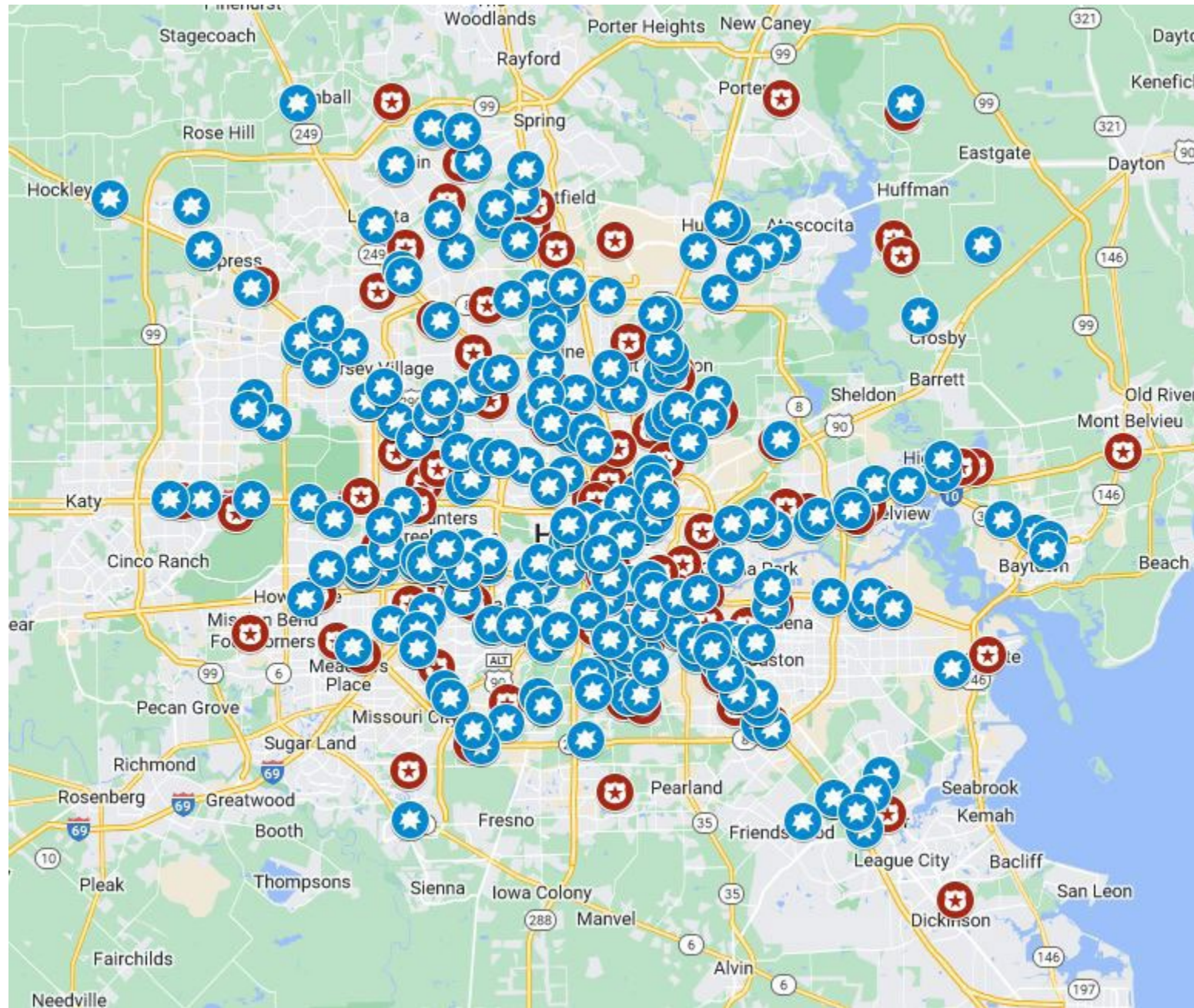
MISSING PERSONS

 Crime Stoppers offers cash rewards in missing persons cases when an investigator has determined that foul play is involved and/or in cases where a minor (16 or younger) has run away with a person that is 18 or older. A common example of the latter is a minor being lured away from a parent or legal guardian for sex trafficking.



TIP LINE 2023 CASES SOLVED

In 2023, the Tip Line Program received **11,812 tips**. These anonymous tipsters helped solve **371 cases** and get **212 arrests**.

TIP LINE HIGHLIGHTED CASES

- March 2023 - Flirtatious Robbery Suspect** - A tipster called the tip line to provide the name of a man that was wanted for robbery. In December 2022, a woman was getting gas when the suspect began flirting with her. She told the suspect she had a boyfriend and attempted to get into her car. The suspect blocked her from being able to get in the car. With his hand in his pocket, he demanded her purse. Before fleeing the scene, the suspect asked the victim “Where’s your boyfriend now?” Thanks to the tipster, the suspect was positively identified and charged.
- April 2023 - Stolen Truck “Sold” on Craigslist** - In September 2022, police were made aware of a victim that was defrauded out of \$20,000. The victim saw a truck online and planned to purchase it from the seller. During the transaction, the victim gave the seller a cashier’s check, but the seller insisted on cash. The victim got the cash and give it to the seller in exchange for the truck, a bill of sale and title. Unfortunately, when the victim tried to register the vehicle, he found out that the truck belonged to a rental company and was sold without their consent.
- May 2023 - Tip Leads to Seizure of \$200k in Drugs and Weapons** - A tipster utilized the mobile app to provide information on a suspect that had an active warrant out of Jefferson County for Possession of a Controlled Substance. Law enforcement began surveillance on the location provided and observed the suspect enter the home with multiple vehicles and multiple people. They would arrive and leave within a short period of time. Believing that the location was a “stash house”, a search warrant was granted and executed. When officers made entry they found Methamphetamine, Cocaine and Promethazine with a street value of \$199,785 along with 7 weapons valued at \$7,500.
- June 2023 - Mass Shooting Thwarted** - A tip came in via the mobile app providing information on a university student that had some concerning and disturbing content on their phone. The tipster was concerned that the suspect had plans to carry out a mass shooting event. This information was quickly relayed to the university police department. When they arrived, they found the suspect was undergoing a severe mental health crisis. They also found information in their phone that supported the tipsters’ concerns. Due to the mental state of the suspect, they were immediately taken to a mental health facility for evaluation and treatment.
- July 2023 - Fatal Hit and Run Fugitive Caught After Five Years on the Run** - A tipster contacted the tip line with the location of a fugitive that was charged with a 2018 fatal hit and run. At the time of the incident, witness reported hearing the suspect call someone stating “I messed up again. I’ve got to get out of here. Come pick me up!” Witnesses also described the suspect as extremely intoxicated with poor balance. Thanks to this tipster the families of the two victims killed will begin to see justice in this case.
- November 2023 - Mom Killed In Front of Son** - A 34-year-old woman, accompanied by her three-year-old son and a friend, was driving when a man pulled up beside her and opened fire. Tragically, the mother lost her life, and her friend sustained injuries from the eight shots fired. Remarkably, the three-year-old in the back seat remained unharmed. Reports suggest that the suspect, in the midst of a paranoid episode, mistakenly believed the mother was following him, even though she was driving ahead of him. A person who shared vital information through the tip line played a crucial role in assisting law enforcement in apprehending the suspect.



SAFE SCHOOL INSTITUTE

SAFE SCHOOL INSTITUTE (SSI)

The Safe School Institute (SSI) is a one-stop center for all aspects of school safety. SSI keeps schools safe by creating a proactive dialogue with students, school staff and law enforcement about personal and school safety. The institute strives to reduce victimization, deter delinquency, and increase campus reporting through prevention-based presentations and trainings.

Since its inception in 1997, the Safe School Institute has evolved into a **FREE**, year-round program that has educated over **1.6 million students** in **107 school districts** in the Greater Houston Area and Texas.

The Institute delivers all three levels of prevention: **primary, secondary, and tertiary**. We are committed to reaching our audience whenever they are able, whether it be during school hours or outside of school hours, on campus or off-campus. Whatever their needs are, the Safe School Institute is available at no cost to provide a customized format that addresses those needs.

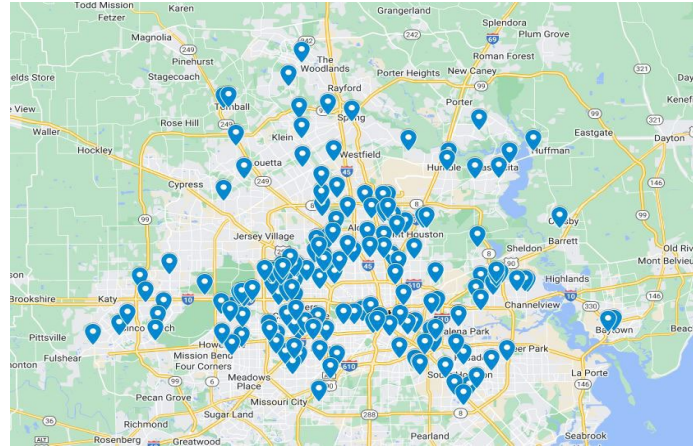

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- In conjunction with the Safe Community Institute, the Safe School Institute and programming team created a Sextortion and Pornography Guide designed for families to address this inappropriate and illegal content online without stigmatizing language. This guide was designed with healthy conversation in mind, to prevent children from victimization, and to empower parents to address a difficult safety topic.
- The Safe School team designed topical safety posters for school campuses across Texas. These posters are available to be distributed post a preventative presentation to reinforce lessons learned.
- The Safe School team created a Drugs in a Snap pamphlet for Middle and High School students. This resource serves as a comprehensive guide covering alcohol, marijuana, fentanyl, and vaping. Drugs in a Snap not only provides detailed statistics and information but also prevention strategies and ways to get help.
- The Statewide team created a newsletter to be distributed every other month for our school safety partners across Texas. In 2023, the newsletter reached over 300 educators, parents, and school administrators.
- In 2023, the statewide team started with three full-time team members and added two more by the end of the year. The five statewide team members reached 54 new schools outside of Harris County within the first year of the program.
- The Safe School Director redesigned and revamped school safety webinars for our two day Quarterly Statewide trainings offered to Crime Stoppers site coordinators, teachers, and school safety personnel across Texas. Three new webinars were added to the day one which provide insight into building school safety curriculum and the importance of a strong marketing strategy to help with growth and

2023 SCHOOL SUCCESS STORIES

2023

The Safe School Institute team was invited to present on teen dating violence and sexual misconduct at a high school in Baytown, Texas. After the presentation, a student personally thanked our staff presenter and shared they had recently had a family member struggle with dating violence in a relationship. The student empathized with how vital the conversation points are to young adults and validated the red flag behaviors highlighted in the presentation compared to what her family member had experienced.

A few days after providing a virtual presentation on cyber safety to teen students at a local school in Houston, Texas, a student at the campus reached out via email to share that they were being bullied by a fellow student and were concerned for their wellbeing. The Safe School Institute team responded to the student and applauded them for their courage, shared the incident with the counselor on campus, and connected this student to the resources and support they needed.

At the conclusion of a human trafficking presentation at a local middle school, our team received positive feedback from the students on the Light 2024 video done by our partners at Goya Foods. The students really like it and it has really made an impact on how they see human trafficking, specifically how it could happen to a student just like them.

After facilitating a presentation on bullying prevention to 5th graders at an elementary school in San Antonio, Texas, the counselor informed our team that students had improved their treatment of one another. Students also took the “on Wednesdays we wear pink” from Mean Girls and made it into a day where they did intentional acts of kindness. A parent even got involved and made shirts for the entire 5th grade cohort.

Following a presentation in Seguin, Texas, a student came forward asking our education specialist for more information about the Tip Line, disclosing that they were going to call the Tip Line regarding dating violence that was occurring to her friend.

Following a presentation on teen dating violence and human trafficking prevention at an early college preparatory school, a student came forward, disclosing concerns about an online relationship she had been engaging in. The counselor was able to offer ongoing support after her disclosure.

STATEWIDE TRAININGS

BACKGROUND

On May 30, 2018, Governor Greg Abbott unveiled his multifaceted “School and Firearm Safety Action Plan” in response to the Santa Fe High School shooting that occurred on May 18, 2018. His Action Plan includes expanding campus Crime Stoppers programs statewide. As the largest Crime Stoppers organization in the country, the Texas Criminal Justice Division asked Crime Stoppers of Houston to roll out our Safe School Program to as many Crime Stoppers organizations across the state – reaching approximately 1,800 school districts.

In response, we are committed to sharing our program, training stakeholders, developing curriculum, and engaging the community so that every Crime Stoppers organization operating within the State of Texas can offer their local schools and their entire community the same life-saving tools and resources we have here.



In 2018, we held our first quarterly training at our headquarters, followed by 6 more in-person quarterly trainings through February 2020. However, with the onset of COVID 19, we moved our trainings to a virtual platform for the remainder of 2020 through present. We’ve reached 291 Crime Stoppers groups/affiliates within Texas, **31 Crime Stoppers groups/affiliates from around the USA** and internationally, and will continue to host quarterly trainings moving forward.

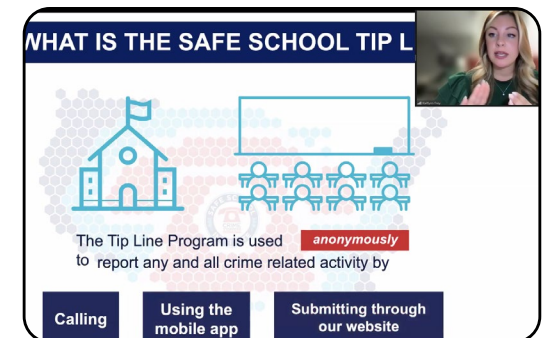

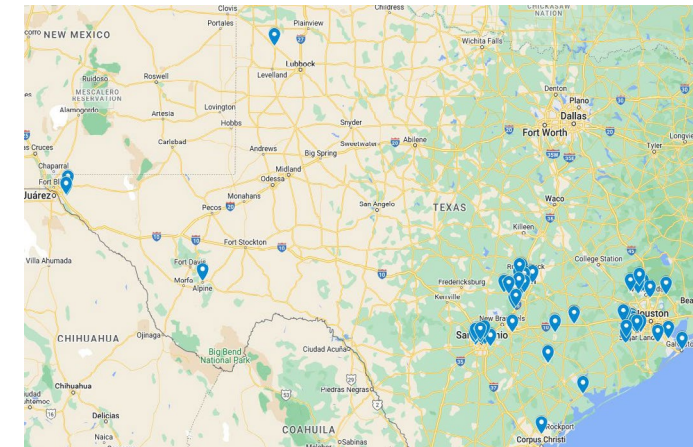
This team is responsible for facilitating presentation requests outside of the Greater Houston Area and building relationships with school campuses and districts across major cities and small towns.

Last year, we educated 30,477 students, 8,257 school staff and law enforcement personnel, and 3,366 parents in Texas. Program development through partnership building has been crucial to our growth and success.

- We continue to collaborate with the Texas Education Agency through monthly coalition meetings, work closely with Education Service Centers, and participate in partner councils in Austin, San Antonio, Dallas, and Greater Houston.

The Institute offers community members one centralized location for all crime-related statistical data, resources, prevention education, public safety awareness content, and victim services. Since inception, we have reached over 3.3 million community members and victims through the four programs housed within the Institute. Crime Stoppers of Houston's **Safe Community Program**, **Victim Services Program**, **The Balanced Voice Podcast**, and all-new **Glenda Gordy Research Center** are all housed under the Safe Community Institute which is built on four pillars:



Seek to understand the needs of all community members through listening and engaging



Be a vessel for proactive dialogue with the purpose of identifying needed change and providing tangible solutions to community needs



Be a reliable source for crime data and statistical research that is easily digestible for all community members



Promote safety and rights for victims and survivors as they navigate the criminal justice system

SAFE COMMUNITY PROGRAM

The Safe Community Program (SCP) identifies and report on crime affecting the Greater Houston Area, then takes propound steps to prevent future crime through citizen empowerment and education. The program educates community members, parents, and law enforcement on critical public safety concerns through free presentations, training, community events, and multi-media resources.



VICTIM SERVICES PROGRAM

The Victim Services and Advocacy Program promotes safety and rights for crime victims and survivors as they navigate the criminal justice process. Through advocacy and collaboration, the department fights for systematic improvements to better support victims and survivors as they pursue justice, healing, and the rebuilding of their lives.

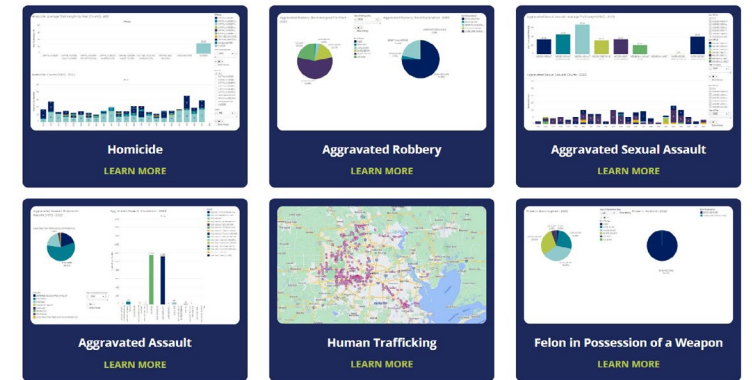
SAFE COMMUNITY INSTITUTE THE GLENDA GORDY RESEARCH CENTER

THE GLENDA GORDY RESEARCH CENTER is housed within the Safe Community Institute at Crime Stoppers of Houston. For many years, Houstonians have expressed a need for an easily accessible, and user-friendly place for crime statistical data in the Greater Houston Area. In our quest to be a solution focused organization, we launched The Glenda Gordy Research Center with the purpose of cohesively reporting on crime statistics so that the public has a comprehensive view of the criminal justice system in Harris County.

The Center not only provides easily digestible crime statistics, but also incorporates an educational center where people can learn about common terms used within our justice system, the roles and responsibilities of local leaders, and more. Our hope for the Research Center is that it will be an all-new kind of resource for community members of all kinds.

WHAT YOU WILL FIND

We have chosen to focus our efforts on felony level offenses that we have fit into 6 categories: Homicide, Aggravated Robbery, Aggravated Sexual Assault, Aggravated Assault, Felon in Possession of a Weapon, and Human Trafficking. Each of these categories includes many different offenses which you can learn more about via our "terminology" section.



The Research Center processes over 5 million data points per month.



THE BALANCED VOICE PODCAST

The Balanced Voice Podcast is a podcast for the community by the community and has a mission to facilitate balanced conversations that offer real solutions about today's most pressing issues. The podcast welcomes local and national leaders to share perspectives on often polarizing issues in a balanced manner.

In Season 5, we welcomed our first co-host, Jennifer Hohman. Since inception through 2023, the podcast had reached over 2.6 million listeners.

2023 HIGHLIGHTS

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Safe Community Program:

- In partnership with the Safe School Institute, we launched our all-new NEEDS (Neurodiversity, Educate, Empower, Deliver, Safety) Program whose mission is to champion the safety, well-being, and empowerment of the special needs community.
- During our annual Back-to-School initiative, we provided 708 parents with resources to help keep their students safe throughout the school year and partnered with the Safe School Institute to provide school supplies to 2,000 students.
- We expanded our College Safety Initiative by providing education to 10 Universities and deepening our partnership with University of Houston Downtown, and Houston Christian University to provide ongoing education and unique resources to their student population.
- We created a Resource Guide for Places of Worship that is designed to empower places of worship and their communities with essential knowledge and help create a secure environment where everyone can gather without fear.

Victim Services & Advocacy:

- We used 4 Victim Impact Statement Videos in parole hearings where parole was denied in all 4 cases.
- We aided in the successful passing on 3 victim-centered pieces of legislation to include SB 1004, SB 402, and HB 1511.

The Balanced Voice Podcast:

- We surpassed 1 Million people reached through The Balanced Voice Podcast since inception.
- We began providing our podcast in video format on Spotify and also integrated weekly interactive polls for our audience.
- We produced multiple on-location episodes, specifically we recorded 2 episodes at our annual Gala with Hollywood star, Mira Sorvino in which we discussed her humanitarian work to help end human trafficking and child exploitation.

The Glenda Gordy Research Center:

- We processed over 48 million datapoints in 2023 and wrote and maintained over 6,000 lines of code.
- We partnered with Deman Disruption to expand their data on Suspected Illicit Massage Businesses (SIMB) and visualize crimes occurring at or near the location of those SIMBs, as well as their proximity to schools, churches, and childcare facilities.
- We partnered with FBI Houston to provide crime offense occurrences for specialized crime categories to the agency throughout the year.

LEADING WOMEN FOR PUBLIC SAFETY

Leading Women for Public Safety(LWPS) is a society of women in the Greater Houston Area who care deeply about public safety and work in tandem with Crime Stoppers of Houston to ensure safety for all.
