## TIP LINE PROGRAM: (713)222-TIPS

The Tip Line Program continues to be a crime solving system and aims to equip and motivate all citizens to report crime. Through collaboration with more than 70 local and federal law enforcement agencies, the Tip Line has proven its success in solving and preventing crime in the Greater Houston Area.



In 2024, the Tip Line received 10,872 tips and assisted in solving 362 cases including 18 murders, 67 assaultive offenses and 60 burglary/robbery/theft cases.

## STATEWIDE EXPANSION

Through our Statewide Expansion efforts, our team strives to be a resource and a solution for school safety education. We currently offer the following to help all school communities across the state of Texas:

- **Statewide Trainings:** In response to the Santa Fe High School shooting in 2018, Governor Greg Abbott asked CSOH to roll our Safe School Program to as many Crime Stoppers organizations across the state – reaching approximately 1,800 school districts.
- **S.A.V.E. Webinars:** In partnership with the Texas Education Agency (TEA), we created our S.A.V.E. to provide resources for teachers, school staff/administration and school-based law enforcement.
- **Safe School Presentations across Texas (outside of Harris County):** In 2023, we expanded our statewide team creating a robust team of presenters across the State.

## VICTIM SERVICES AND ADVOCACY PROGRAM

The Victim Services and Advocacy Program promotes safety, healing, justice and rights for crime victims and survivors. It is designed to act as an advocate on all stages of victimization and ensure crime victims and survivors have a voice in our criminal justice system.

In 2021, Crime Stoppers of Houston identified a major gap in post-conviction advocacy services. To meet that need, we established our first of its kind Victim Impact Video Project which provides victims the opportunity to record their story in video format and submit that video to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles so that their story can be heard at all future parole hearings whether they are there in person or not.

**To date, we have created 47 Victim Impact Statement Videos and 8 have been used in parole hearings.** In all cases they were used, parole has been denied. As the word spreads about this important project, our team has worked hard to create a scalable process.

## THE GLENDA GORDY RESEARCH CENTER

In 2022, we launched The Glenda Gordy Research Center to give Houstonians a cohesive and clear view of the criminal justice system here in Harris County. ## **OPENED 2017**

In January 2017, Crime Stoppers of Houston opened the doors to its first-ever home, The Dave Ward Building, Crime Stoppers of Houston, providing the answer to all things public safety and crime prevention and standing as the hub for all crime trends, tips and tactics.

The facility houses a community center where citizens, non-profits, students and faculty, law enforcement agencies and community partners convene for educational purposes, a victim's family room for controlled media interviews and law enforcement case meetings, a state-of-the-art press conference room, program offices that deliver direct crime prevention services to the community, and a Law Enforcement Detail Office to house the Tip Line Program.

## **BUILDING IMPACT:**

- From 2017-2024, over 31,931 citizens have walked through our doors.
- In 2024, 1,308 citizens utilized the building.



## **MEMORIAL GARDEN**

The first Harris County Officers Memorial Garden, dedicated in tribute to the fallen Peace Officers of Harris County opened in May 2017. ### HOW IT WORKS

The Tip Line offers cash rewards to anonymous citizens who provide tips to help solve unsolved crimes and locate wanted fugitives in the Greater Houston Area. Crime Stoppers may pay a cash reward of up to \$5,000 on all felony crimes that happen in the Greater Houston/Harris County area. The only requirement is you must report your tip directly to Crime Stoppers by calling (713) 222-TIPS (8477), going online to [crime-stoppers.org](https://crime-stoppers.org) or by using the Crime Stoppers mobile app.

## THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

Crime Stoppers may pay a cash reward of up to \$5,000 on all felony crimes that happen in the Greater Houston/Harris County area. Here are things you should know about our Tip Line:

- To be eligible for a cash reward, you must report your tip directly to Crime Stoppers of Houston.
- Crime Stoppers will never ask you for your name, phone number, address, or any other information that could identify you. We do not record phone calls or have caller ID. No one will know you called us unless you tell them.
- Once you give us your tip, you will be given a code number. This is the only way Crime Stoppers can identify you. Crime Stoppers cannot call you with the status because we don't ask for your phone number. You need to remember this number and provide it when you call back to check the status of your tip.
- When you call back with your code number we will let you know if your tip helped law enforcement arrest or charge a felony suspect/fugitive. If it did, you may be eligible for a cash reward and will give you instructions on how to retrieve your cash reward. You will not be asked to show any ID.

# TIP LINE SIGNIFICANT CASES

## 2017 HIGHLIGHTS

- January 2017 – Solved cases for engaging in organized criminal activity, involved De Boulle Jewelry - On September 20, 2016, a tipster called the Crime Stoppers tip line to report that Tevin McCray was one of the suspects responsible for multiple robberies in the Houston area. The tipster called back on 11/15/2016 and advised that Tevin was in jail, arrested on unrelated charges. This information was forwarded to HPD's Robbery Division and following a lengthy investigation, it was discovered that suspect McCray was engaged in an organized crime ring. McCray, along with fourteen (14) additional suspects, conspired to commit Aggravated Robberies using deadly weapons (firearms and/or a hammer) in the Houston area from June 1, 2016 through January 1, 2017. Houston Police informed that the tipster was instrumental in the suspect being indicted on Engaging in Organized Criminal Activity on February 13, 2017, and being held on a \$1,000,000 bond.
- March 2017 – Unlawful Practice of Dentistry - On February 2, 2017, a tipster called the Crime Stoppers afterhours center and stated he was observing suspicious activity from his neighbors' residence. The tipster advised people were in and out of his neighbor's mobile home throughout the day. On February 6, 2017, the tipster called Crime Stoppers and advised that that his neighbor was offering dental work from his mobile home. The tipster stated that he believes that his neighbor is not a real dentist, but there is constant flow of people in and out of the residence and believes the people were paying customers (unknowing victims). The tipster stated that the possible suspect leaves this location at approximately 6pm, that there are no signs posted anywhere, and believes that the suspect was practicing dental work without a license. The tipster provided the suspect's identifying information, vehicle description, and a physical address for the illegal dentistry practice. This information was forwarded HPD Major Offenders Division for follow up. A proactive investigation was conducted during which an undercover officer pretended to be a patron. The suspect had dentistry tools and used them to inspect the mouth of the officer. The suspect then advised he would remove a tooth, gave the price he would charge, and began to prep for the tooth extraction. Officers rushed in and arrested the suspect on March 8, 2017. The suspect was arrested and charged with the Unlawful Practice Dentistry.
- May 2017 – Woman robbed at gunpoint in her own driveway - On April 18, 2017, a woman had returned home from shopping at a local store. As she was exiting her vehicle, she was approached by the suspect holding a gun and demanding her property. The woman handed over her cellular phone, wallet, and all the cash she had on her. The suspect then ran to a dark colored Pontiac and fled the location. Her cell phone was recovered the next day. Police discovered the victim's phone contained undeleted self-recorded videos of the suspect and his accomplice driving the vehicle throughout the day (after robbing the female victim). One of these videos was shown on local news media to generate leads. Crime Stoppers received several tips in regards to the news coverage, but one tip identified the main suspect by name and assisted officers in developing a photo array. Despite being afraid, the female victim positively identified the suspect as the person who robbed her.
- October 2017 – 9mm at a local High School - On October 18, 2017, at 10:56 a.m., a call came into the tip line regarding a social media conversation about a student at a local high school had a gun in the waist band of his pants. Crime Stoppers notified the school resource officer of the student that had a weapon the classroom. The resource officer and the assistant principal located student in the classroom and instructed him to exit the class. After searching the student, they found no gun was located. The assistant principal instructed the remaining students to step out of the classroom to complete a thorough search for a weapon. A couple of rows over from where suspect was sitting, another student's back pack was located that contained a black Glock 17 (9) millimeter automatic weapon. The school resource officer took possession of the weapon and ensured it was secured. As a direct result of the student tipster charges of possession of prohibited weapon in a weapon free zone were filed on the student that actually had the gun.
- October 2017 – Human Trafficking of Dallas Teen - The suspect in this case Trevien Thomas or "Triggah", is charged with five (5) cases, which include, Human Trafficking, Aggravated Kidnapping, Compelling Prostitution, Aggravated Sexual Assault of a Child and Manufacture/Delivery of a Controlled Substance. Thomas is also a member of the "Rolling 60's Crips." On May 23, 2016, a 14-year-old girl, met Thomas in Dallas and agreed to hang out together. When she got into the car with Thomas, he took her against her will to Houston. Thomas showed the girl a gun and told her if she didn't do what he said, he would kill her. The victim was held by Thomas until May 28, 2016 where he kept her in three (3) various motels and published an advertisement on "Backpage. com" for sex which included pictures of the victim. The victim reported that she was forced to have sex with several men including Thomas. She was able to escape on



May 28, 2016 and called police to report that she taken from the Dallas area and was being forced into prostitution. Investigators were able to serve subpoenas and get information that Thomas placed the ad and found messages where Thomas discussed going to Dallas. As a result, a warrant for Thomas' arrest was issued. On July 19, 2017, Thomas was featured on Fugitive Friday and KTRK news. A tipster contacted the tip line that identified Thomas from the featured video and provided a location he could be found. In addition to the warrants, he was also in possession of a stolen Glock 27 handgun and what appeared to be Ecstasy and Xanax.

- November 2017 – High End “Shoppers” Case - On May 31, 2017, two female suspects walked into Sacks Fifth Avenue and approached the Burberry section pretending to be shoppers. The suspects then selected 22 items and stuffed them into a gray Dillard's shopping bag and walked out of the store without paying. Loss prevention staff at the store observed the two women on surveillance cameras but was not able to catch up to them before the exited the store and fled the scene in a white car. On September 4, 2017 loss prevention staff noticed the same two women enter the store again and approach a rack of dresses and coats. The two suspects selected 17 items and placed them into a gray Dillard's shopping bag. On this occasion the loss prevention officer was able to catch up to the suspects and grab the bag of clothes but the women got away. The approximate value of clothing from both dates was placed at \$18,997. At the request of the Houston Police Department, Crime Stoppers issued a press release with still images from the store security cameras asking for the public's assistance in identifying the suspects. In November 2017 Crime Stoppers received an anonymous tip that identified one of the women by an alias. With that information detectives were able to positively identify both suspects as black men named Wesley Daniels Jr and Jermarcus Jerome Singleton. Crime Stoppers was asked by HPD to issue another press release to seek assistance in locating the two men. Crime Stoppers later received another tip that provided the location of the men and they were both arrested without incident.

## 2018 HIGHLIGHTS

- January 2018 – The Lam Case - After two days of not being able to reach his parents by phone, Richard Lam drove to their home to check on them and called 911 when no one came to the door. When deputies arrived, they found the doors were all locked, so Richard broke a window to allow them entry. Once inside, they found the home ransacked and Bao and Jenny Lam bound and shot. Investigators were able to piece together the moments leading up to the brutal murders thanks to the neighborhood surveillance cameras. The video showed two unidentified men pull up to the gated subdivision and crawl under the gate. Surveillance video also showed the suspects entering the Lam's home and the vehicle they were driving: a black Lincoln Navigator. The Lams were ambushed 20 minutes later when they returned home from dinner. Suspects could be seen leaving the home shortly before midnight in the couple's Porsche only to return repeatedly in the days that followed. On January 16, 2018, a tipster called the tip line and reported the black Navigator on the news was at an apartment complex on Windfern Road in Houston. The tipster also reported that they noticed the suspects removing large items from a silver four door Porsche around 12:00 am. All three suspects were located and arrested based on the detailed information provided by the tipster.
- February 2018 – Self-Harm by a High School Student - On February 27, 2018, a tipster sent a message to the Crime Stoppers Mobile App providing information on a student who cut her herself and believed she was in danger of causing additional harm to herself. The tipster identified where the female cut herself and that she is a 9th grader at Deer Park High School. The Crime Stoppers investigator contacted the Assistant Principle and advised a student may be harming herself by cutting and suggested she and the school nurse make contact with the student. The Assistant Principle spoke to the student and verified that she had indeed cut herself on the arms. This occurred due to a break up with her boyfriend. The Assistant Principle reached out to the mother and was able to provide her with some literature and resources for counseling.
- May 2018 – Purse Theft at H-E-B - A tip came into the Crime Stoppers Tip Line that identified three suspects who were involved in a purse theft at a local H-E-B store. The suspects stole the complainant's purse from her shopping cart while she was unloading groceries into her vehicle. The suspects then went to several stores and purchased 7 PlayStation 4 game consoles with the complainant's credit cards. After seeing a clip aired on ABC 13, the tipster contacted the Tip Line and identified two of the persons shown as brother and sister and the third person by his street name, “Poppa”. The Crime Stoppers tip led to the identification and charging of all three persons involved.
- June 2018 – Court House ATM Heists - Over the course of a month and a half three suspects caused over \$200,000 in damages and stole over \$60,000 in cash from stolen ATM's. They used the same routine with lookout vehicles and stolen trucks to crash into three different Harris County courthouses to steal the ATM's inside. A tipster called the tip line to provide the full name of all three suspects after they saw information about the case on patch.com. Crime Stoppers



provided the information to investigators that were very familiar with the suspects from prior cases. Based on this information investigators began surveillance and saw all three suspects driving personal vehicles with other unidentified suspects in the stolen trucks used in the burglaries. On May 22, 2018, four suspects drove a stolen truck into a downtown tax office while three other vehicles assisted by being lookout/chase vehicles. A marked unit responded to the burglary and gave chase to the stolen truck. During the chase officers observed an ATM in the bed of the truck. At the end of the chase one of the named suspects was arrested with five other suspects. During the arrest a four-month-old infant and two-year old toddler were found in the backseat. As a result of the tip provided all three suspects were identified and charged.

- September 2018 – Line Skipper and Fatal Hit and Run - Crime Stoppers received a tip via the mobile app on August 30, 2018 providing information about a suspect, “Ali” that was responsible for a 2015 fatal hit and run. On December 27, 2015 the victim was standing in line to place an order at a gas stations fast food restaurant. Ali skipped the line in front of the victim to place his own order. The clerk refused to take his order so Ali left the restaurant, went to the gas station, made a purchase and returned to his vehicle in the parking lot. Meanwhile, the victim placed and received his order then returned to his vehicle and drove away. The suspect followed the victim for more than five (5) miles before intentionally crashing into his vehicle several times along the way. Ali eventually hit the victim’s vehicle hard enough that caused it to roll over several times before striking a tree. Ali’s vehicle also rolled over, but he managed to flee the scene on foot without rendering aid to the victim. The victim was transported by Life Flight to Houston Herman Memorial Hospital where he was found to have a broken neck, spine, and collar bone. The complainant later died as a result of his injuries. Ali was located and arrested as a result of the information provided by the tipster.

## 2019 HIGHLIGHTS

- February 2019 – Fake Esthetician and Fake Botox - Crime Stoppers received a tip via the mobile app about a person that was believed to be posing as a licensed esthetician and administering cosmetic injections. They expressed concern for the safety of future clients. This information was quickly sent to investigators which set an undercover investigation into motion. During the investigation, it was learned that the suspect was performing non-surgical cosmetic procedures without a license or the supervision of a doctor. The suspect was arrested after an undercover officer was given a quote and prepped for injections. When a reporter asked if the suspect had anything to say, the suspect replied, “Hi

beautiful”. It was later determined that some of the \$11,000+ drugs used were not FDA approved.

- May 2019 – Serial Rapist in the Making - Local police from Pasadena and Fort Bend County issued a plea to the public for assistance in identifying a rape suspect they deemed a serial rapist in the making. This suspect reportedly stalked the victim and followed her from a gym parking lot to her home before sexual assaulting her. Police released pictures of the suspect’s vehicle which was a very distinctive green with a different color front panel. The suspect began making changes to the car to conceal the unique characteristics. Fortunately, a tipster recognized the car and called the tip line. As a result, the 18-year-old suspect was charged and arrested.
- June 2019 – Taco Truck Owner Killed - On June 6, 2019, a well-known and respected owner of a taco truck exited a store on South Post Oak and walked toward his truck. A few moments later, a white sedan pulled up next to the truck. One suspect approached the victim with a long gun visible and shot and killed him without warning. Three other suspects exited the sedan and began going through the pockets of the victim, taking all of the contents found. All four suspects fled the scene. A tipster contacted the tip line and provided the name, “Conway”, and location of the shooter who also had a warrant for Domestic Violence. As a result of this tip, Conway was arrested and charged with Capital Murder. The remaining suspects have also been identified.
- October 2019 – Motel Babysitter - On October 9, 2019, the Harris County Fire Marshall Service responded to a fire at a motel located on Cypresswood Ct. in Spring, Texas. Investigators arrived to find the building heavily engulfed by fire and smoke. Investigators were able to determine that two children were left alone in the motel while their caretaker went to get pizza. The oldest child reported being in the bed crying while it was on fire. A guest on the same floor heard the fire alarm and both children screaming and stepped out of his room to find the oldest child holding a cigarette lighter. That guest decided to take the children to the motel’s front office since there was not an adult with them. When the caretaker returned, she admitted to leaving the children alone for a short period and was charged with two counts of child endangerment. A call came into the tip line that provided the location of the suspect and she was arrested without incident.
- November 2019 – Persistent Tipster Helps Nab Arsonist - On October 11, 2019 a suspect was seen on video setting fire to a palm tree which quickly spread to a fence that was connected to a local restaurant. A tipster contacted the tip line and provided information on a person that had been seen walking in the same area. They stated that they did not know the suspect but recognized his face from a Crime Stoppers flyer.





The tipster followed the suspect's walking route as they drove and relayed real time information to the Crime Stoppers investigator. With the tipster on one line our investigator was then able to pass the information along to dispatch for patrol to make contact. Officers were able to identify the suspect and found that he had two open city warrants. The suspect was arrested on the open warrants while our investigator was still on the phone with them. The suspect was later charged with the arson case.

- December 2019 – Nassau Bay Police Officer Hit and Killed - On December 10, 2019, Sgt. Kaila Sullivan of the Nassau Bay Police Department was assisting another officer with a traffic stop. The driver of the car had a warrant out of Harris County and began fighting with the officer while they were trying to place him in custody. He was able to break free and re-enter his car. As he sped away, he hit Sgt. Sullivan with the vehicle which resulted in injuries that ultimately took her life. Crime Stoppers of Houston announced a Fallen Hero Reward of up to \$20,000 for information leading to the capture of the suspect. Within 24 hours a tip was received providing the location of a hotel where the suspect was hiding allegedly, with the assistance of his family. As a result of this tip, the suspect was taken into custody without no further incident on December 12, 2019.

## 2020 HIGHLIGHTS

- January 2020 - Godson Shoots and Kills Godparents - On December 4, 2019, a man entered an illegal game room operated by his godparents and went to the back bedroom where the two were sleeping. After approximately fifteen minutes, the suspect discharged his firearm four to five times killing both. He left the back bedroom and entered the living room area where customers were playing slot machines. While in the living room area, he began shooting towards the customers striking a third victim in the abdomen. The suspect then attempted to shoot the other customers but the firearm malfunctioned. The suspect eventually fled the scene, leaving the firearm at the rear of the residence. A tipster utilized the Crime Stoppers website to provide the name and location of this suspect.
- February 2020 - Illegal Dumping Tip Results in Large Drug Bust - Crime Stoppers received a tip about a man that dumped approximately 200 pounds of trash in a drainage ditch behind his home. When deputies arrived at the suspects home to execute a warrant, they discovered the suspect and two small children were living in terrible conditions with drugs and guns in plain view. Over \$100,174 in illegal drugs were recovered from the home. This included over 750 grams of Heroin, 79 grams of Crystal Methamphetamine and 7 grams of Xanax.
- March 2020 - Animal Cruelty Fugitive Nabbed - The HSPCA was called on July 1st about a puppy locked inside a vehicle. When they arrived, they found the puppy on the back floorboard, tethered by a leash to the front headrest and panting heavily. All the vehicle windows were up apart from a crack in the sunroof. When the puppy was removed, the internal temperature of the vehicle was over 125 degrees. The puppy's owner was featured by Crime Stoppers during a February 2020 Animal Cruelty Fugitive Sweep. A tipster called the tip line providing the location of the suspect who was arrested without incident.
- April 2020 - H-E-B Employee Attacked by Robbery Suspect - Crime Stoppers received a tip that identified a suspect that attacked an H-E-B employee. The employee witnessed the suspect exit the store with a cart full of groceries without making any attempt to pay for them. When the suspect saw the victim behind him in the parking lot, he suddenly stopped and pushed the cart back in the direction of the victim. The suspect then raised both hands and got into a fighting stance. Not wanting to fight, the victim turned and walked away. As the victim was walking away, the suspect approached him from behind and punched him in the side of his head. The tipster also reported that the suspect was currently in the Fort Bend County jail for a similar case at another H-E-B. As a result of the information provided, the suspect was charged and is awaiting transfer to Harris County.
- May 2020 - Stabbed in the Head - On August 25, 2018, a victim was walking northbound on Fulton St. in Houston. A male suspect walked up from behind, produced a knife and demanded money. The victim reported that he told them "I need your money to feed my kids." He then began stabbing the victim in the head multiple times before robbing them of their belongings. A witness gave chase, tackled, and held the suspect down until police arrived. The suspect was charged with Aggravated Robbery with a Deadly Weapon and posted bond. He subsequently failed to appear in court and a warrant was issued for his arrest. An anonymous tipster utilized the mobile app to provide a location of where the suspect could be located. As a result of this information the suspect was arrested again without further incident.
- July 2020 - Serial Cell Phone Robbery Suspects - Between the dates of May 18th and June 22nd, two armed men entered nine different Metro PCS Stores with the intent to rob the store. In each case, the men would pose as normal customers and inquire about phone cases and/or screen protectors. The suspects would then produce a weapon forcing store personnel to open the money safe. Once the safes were open the men would take all the money and all available iPhones before fleeing the scene. In several cases, the suspect would also rob the employees of their



personal keys, wallets, and cash. An anonymous tip was received that provided the name and address of both suspects. Acting on the tip, HPD attempted to pull over one of the suspects as he was leaving his house. He attempted to flee leading police on a high-speed chase. During the chase, the suspect drove on the wrong side of the road, rammed several police cars, and threw a gun out of the window. The suspect then drove back to his home and ran inside. Police were then able to take him into custody without further incident.

- August 2020 - Felony Bond Fugitives Back Behind Bars - Crime Stoppers highlighted a list of over 60 victims that were killed by suspects that were released on multiple felony bonds, bond forfeiture and/or personal bonds. We received tips that provided the location of two suspects that were featured on this list. One of the suspects was out on two felony bonds for 8 days before he shot and killed a man during an argument. As a result of the tipster's information both suspects are back behind bars pending trial.
- September 2020 - Suspect in the 2019 Murder of Trans Woman Caught - In September 2019, the victim and her roommate got into an argument because she would not take the suspect to the laundromat to wash clothes. The suspect became enraged and shot the victim eleven (11) times then fled the scene. Unfortunately, the victim did not survive her injuries. The suspect was quickly charged but remained at large hiding out in the Dallas area. One year later, Crime Stoppers received a tip that provided the location of the suspect. Based on the information the tipster provided, the suspect was arrested without further incident.
- September 2020 - Hit and Run Suspect Identified - A group of friends were riding their four-wheelers and motorcycles when they noticed a BMW stopped at a traffic light. For unknown reasons, the driver put the car in gear and intentionally hit the victims then drove off without rendering aid. The impact caused one to flip over their handlebars, land on the trunk of the car then fall to the ground. This case received media attention because the incident was unprovoked and random. A tipster contacted the tip line and provided the name and location of the suspect who has been charged with a second-degree felony.
- October 2020 - Serial Robbery Suspect Arrested - Between May and June 2020 the suspect planned to meet with multiple victims to purchase items the victims listed for sale on popular apps (Offer Up, Let Go and Facebook Marketplace). During the transaction, the suspect would "inspect" the item, assault the victim then flee with the items and cash to an awaiting vehicle. The items he got away with included \$500 cash, two iPhones and two Louis Vuitton purses. One of the victims managed to get a picture of the suspect

that was featured in the media. Crime Stoppers received an anonymous tip that provided the name and location of the suspect. As a result of this information the suspect was charged five felonies.

- October 2020 - Shoplifters Used LYFT as A Getaway Driver - In February 2020, an unsuspecting LYFT driver picked up a fare that included two females and a male with a local store as their destination. Two of the suspects (male and female) went into the store while the third waited with the driver. While in the store, the two suspects placed multiple items in a basket then attempted to exit without paying. Before they could get out of the store, an employee approached and asked for a receipt. The male suspect pulled out a gun and pistol whipped the employee and both suspects ran out of the store. The male ran to the waiting LYFT and the female ran to another business. Once in the car the male suspect used the driver's phone to call the remaining female to get her exact location so they could pick her up. When they arrived, both suspects got out of the car and all three took off. Police were able to identify the two females, but they remained at large until a tipster provided a location.
- December 2020 - Fiery Beer Run - A male suspect entered a corner store and grabbed an 18-pack of Modelo beer, walked out of the store without paying for the merchandise, and got into his pickup truck. The store clerk gave chase but was unsuccessful in catching the suspect or retrieving the stolen beer. The suspect hurriedly placed his vehicle in reverse, struck a gas pump and fled the scene. After striking the gas pump, flames engulfed the pumps causing nearly \$9,000 in damages. An anonymous tip was received that provided the name and location of the suspect.
- December 2020 - Domestic Dispute Ends with Victim Set on Fire - A male suspect became upset with his girlfriend and accused her of stealing an item of his clothing. He walked out of the house to his car and returned with a plastic water bottle that was filled with gasoline. A witness told police that the suspect poured the contents of the bottle onto the victim's body and used a lighter to set her on fire. At that point, the suspect fled the scene, and the witness was able to use a comforter to put the fire out. The victim sustained severe burns to her chest, shoulder, side of her neck and thighs. The suspect was charged but remained at large until a tipster provided his current location.

## 2021 HIGHLIGHTS

- February 2021 - Forged Check Used to "Set Em Free" - A local attorney received a phone call from "Set Em Free" bail bonds company to authenticate a check that had been presented for \$1,850 to post bond for a man in jail. The attorney reported that he did not issue that check and did not



give anyone permission to use it. The suspect reportedly stole the check to bail her significant other out of jail for a domestic violence related charge. As part of the process the suspect had to provide her id and social security card when she presented the check. The victim quickly identified the suspect as an employee of his law firm and that she used his rubber stamp signature on the check. Based on this information, the suspect was charged with forgery but remained at large until a tipster provided her location.

- July 2021 - Young Mother Killed While Holding Son - On July 1, 2021, the victim was preparing for her sons first birthday and was holding her son when her ex began arguing with her. The suspect produced a firearm and shot the victim who was holding the toddler. Prior to fleeing the scene, the suspect also shot the one-year-old boy in the lower leg. The toddler was transported to a hospital with non-life threatening injuries. Sadly, the young mother did not survive her injuries. The suspect was out on seven felony bonds when this incident took place.
- August 2021 - Road Rage After Astros Game - On June 6, 2021, Paul Castro and his sons just left Minute Maid Park after watching an Astros game. While in traffic, a driver of another car got into a verbal altercation with the Castro's over letting cars into the lane of traffic and finger gestures were exchanged. The suspect then aggressively followed the Castro's onto the freeway. Mr. Castro attempted to elude the suspects then heard several gunshots and saw that the truck's back window shatter. Unfortunately, David Castro (17) was shot in the back of the head and didn't survive. Crime Stoppers of Houston conducted a press conference with David's grief-stricken family to plead for the public's assistance. A few days after the press conference an anonymous tipster called the tip line and provided very detailed information regarding the suspect and incident that was not released to the media. The Houston Police Department was able to obtain a search warrant after verification of the tipster's information and the suspect was arrested.

## 2022 HIGHLIGHTS

- March 2022 - Hit & Run Suspect Caught - In the early morning of January 7, 2022, a driver of a pickup truck was traveling at a high speed when they hit a pedestrian that was walking down the street. The driver fled the scene without rendering aid to the victim. A passerby noticed the victim lying face down on the road and called for help. The victim suffered very serious injuries and a heart attack as a result. Images of the suspect captured at a store shortly before the incident were distributed to the media. A tipster utilized the mobile app to provide information that aided police in charging and arresting the suspect.
- May 2022 - Wanted Human Trafficker Caught After Six Months on the Run - On December 9, 2021, Crime Stoppers held a press conference asking for help in locating a Human Trafficking fugitive that fled the area during his trial. The suspect attended the first three days of his trial but skipped out before learning that he had been found guilty and sentenced to 40 years for trafficking a sixteen-year-old victim. The fugitive remained on the run for six months before a tip was received that provided the location of his hideout.
- June 2022 - Nearly \$1 Million in Stolen Testing Equipment Recovered - In October 2021, a suspect broke into a business that sells extremely specialized testing equipment. The suspect made two trips to the business removing the testing equipment that was valued at \$950,000. Sometime later, the company received a phone call from an out of state business that advised they had attempted to purchase the equipment in an online purchase. Prior to paying for the equipment, they realized the equipment had been stolen. Charges were filed on the suspect, but he remained at large until a tipster provided his location using the Crime Stoppers mobile app.
- September 2022 - Final Suspect Caught in Martha Medina Case - In September 2021, a 71-year-old grandmother was tragically killed during a jugging incident. The victim, Martha Medina, was followed from a local bank to a McDonalds restaurant where she went to get breakfast. As she exited her car two suspects approached and grabbed Ms. Medina's purse off her shoulder. The suspects then got back into their vehicle and reversed it over Ms. Medina and proceeded to drag her a short distance. Unfortunately, Ms. Medina did not survive her injuries. Two of the suspects were charged and arrested but the final suspect eluded police until a tip provided his name and location. The driver of the vehicle was out on two bonds when this incident occurred. The first was for a 2019 Capital Murder and the second was for an Aggravated Robbery the same year.
- November 2022 - Parolee Arrested for Robbing the Same Locations Six Years Later - Thanks to a very active and detailed tipster an Aggravated Robbery suspect is behind bars. Between February and September (2022), the suspect committed six different aggravated robberies. He would use various weapons to threaten store employees as he demanded cash. Police learned that the suspect had been paroled from prison just one month prior to these cases. He had been sentenced to 16 years for a string of 2016 Aggravated Robberies. Coincidentally, two of the locations he robbed in 2016 are the same location he robbed in this string of cases. Once he was arrested, the suspect confessed to the robberies and apologized for his behavior.



- December 2022 - Killer of 82-Year-Old Caught - In October of 2022, a concerned woman went to check on her 82-year-old brother after receiving a strange call from his number. When she arrived, she found the apartment located in a senior living facility had been broken into and her brother on the ground covered in blood. A plea went out to the community for information that included pictures from the facilities security cameras. Two months later a tipster contacted the tip line providing the name and location of the suspect featured in the news. Based on that information, the suspect was charged and arrested. He subsequently confessed to the Capital Murder.

### 2023 HIGHLIGHTS

- March 2023 - Flirtatious Robbery Suspect - A tipster called the tip line to provide the name of a man that was wanted for robbery. In December 2022, a woman was getting gas when the suspect began flirting with her. She told the suspect she had a boyfriend and attempted to get into her car. The suspect blocked her from being able to get in the car. With his hand in his pocket, he demanded her purse. Before fleeing the scene, the suspect asked the victim "Where's your boyfriend now?" Thanks to the tipster, the suspect was positively identified and charged.
- April 2023 - Stolen Truck "Sold" on Craigslist - In September 2022; police were made aware of a victim that was defrauded out of \$20,000. The victim saw a truck online and planned to purchase it from the seller. During the transaction, the victim gave the seller a cashier's check, but the seller insisted on cash. The victim got the cash and give it to the seller in exchange for the truck, a bill of sale and title. Unfortunately, when the victim tried to register the vehicle, he found out that the truck belonged to a rental company and was sold without their consent.
- May 2023 - Tip Leads to Seizure of \$200k in Drugs and Weapons - A tipster utilized the mobile app to provide information on a suspect that had an active warrant out of Jefferson County for Possession of a Controlled Substance. Law enforcement began surveillance on the location provided and observed the suspect enter the home with multiple vehicles and multiple people. They would arrive and leave within a short period of time. Believing that the location was a "stash house", a search warrant was granted and executed. When officers made entry they found Methamphetamine, Cocaine and Promethazine with a street value of \$199,785 along with 7 weapons valued at \$7,500.
- June 2023 - Mass Shooting Thwarted - A tip came in via the mobile app providing information on a university student that had some concerning and disturbing content on their phone. The tipster was concerned that the suspect had plans to carry out a mass shooting event. This information

was quickly relayed to the university police department. When they arrived, they found the suspect was undergoing a severe mental health crisis. They also found information in their phone that supported the tipsters' concerns. Due to the mental state of the suspect, they were immediately taken to a mental health facility for evaluation and treatment.

- July 2023 - Fatal Hit and Run Fugitive Caught After Five Years on the Run - A tipster contacted the tip line with the location of a fugitive that was charged with a 2018 fatal hit and run. At the time of the incident, witness reported hearing the suspect call someone stating "I messed up again. I've got to get out of here. Come pick me up!" Witnesses also described the suspect as extremely intoxicated with poor balance. Thanks to this tipster the families of the two victims killed will begin to see justice in this case.
- November 2023 - Mom Killed In Front of Son - A 34-year-old woman, accompanied by her three-year-old son and a friend, was driving when a man pulled up beside her and opened fire. Tragically, the mother lost her life, and her friend sustained injuries from the eight shots fired. Remarkably, the three-year-old in the back seat remained unharmed. Reports suggest that the suspect, in the midst of a paranoid episode, mistakenly believed the mother was following him, even though she was driving ahead of him. A person who shared vital information through the tip line played a crucial role in assisting law enforcement in apprehending the suspect.

### 2024 HIGHLIGHTS

- February 2024-Woman Scams Adoption Agency- In November 2023, an adoption agency reached out to law enforcement to report an elaborate \$11,000 scam. The suspect posed as a 31-week pregnant woman intending to place her baby for adoption. When asked for identification and documentation, she claimed her ID had been stolen and promised to provide the necessary paperwork. Meanwhile, she began requesting financial assistance and other support from the agency.
- As the supposed due date approached, the suspect's demands escalated, and she repeatedly changed her delivery date, raising suspicion. Concerned, the agency searched the name she provided on Facebook and discovered a startling truth: the ultrasound images and pregnancy test she had shared were posted on someone else's profile. Investigators interviewed the suspect, who offered conflicting information and multiple due dates. Charges were filed, but she remained at large until a tip revealed her location. Ultimately, the suspect was arrested, took a plea deal, and was sentenced to two years in a state jail.
- March 2024 - Nearly \$1 Million in Stolen Vehicles





Recovered-Crime Stoppers received a web tip with details about a suspect involved in stealing vehicles to sell the parts. Acting on this information, investigators conducted surveillance at a site being used to dismantle stolen vehicles and sell the parts individually through Facebook. A subsequent search warrant enabled detectives to recover 19 vehicles valued at \$839,202, along with various stolen vehicle parts.

- April 2024 - Capital Murder of Traveling Professor Solved-On October 4, 2023, police officers responded to a home invasion capital murder at a residence in Pasadena, Texas. Upon arrival, officers made the grim discovery of a 43-year-old international professor with a fatal gunshot wound to the chest. Tragically, the victim was pronounced deceased at the scene by medical personnel. The investigation revealed that the professor was confronted by five suspects upon entering the residence, and shortly after, was shot and killed. A critical tip provided information identifying the five suspects, who were subsequently arrested and charged with capital murder.
- May 2024 - Elderly Victim Defrauded of over \$35K - Between October 4, 2022, and April 12, 2023, a suspect exploited an elderly victim's debit card to rack up over \$35,000 in unauthorized purchases. The fraud was uncovered when the victim received a bank alert about an overdraft, exposing a staggering total of \$95,738 in fraudulent transactions. The suspect used the stolen funds for personal gain, making payments to Reliant/Stream Energy, Amazon, Lyft, and Squareup.com. They also financed a home remodeling project, paid off traffic tickets, and completed 47 transactions using a Lyft account, among other expenditures. Thanks to a crucial tip, the suspect was identified, arrested, and ultimately convicted, bringing justice to the victim.
- May 2024 - Juvenile Suspects Charged in Fatal Shooting at Houston Business-A brave tipster called the tip line to provide information on a tragic case. On March 20, 2024, officers responded to 911 calls reporting gunshots inside a business and multiple males fleeing the scene. Inside, officers found the victim deceased behind the counter with apparent gunshot wounds. Five 9mm cartridge casings were recovered and sent for processing. Surveillance footage revealed one juvenile suspect speaking with the victim, two others acting as lookouts near the entrance, and a fourth entering with a firearm pointed at the victim. The victim attempted to defend themselves with a handgun but was fatally shot when the armed suspect opened fire. All four suspects fled in a recently stolen vehicle. The investigation uncovered that one suspect was wearing an ankle monitor during the crime. This tip helped solve a case that could have gone unsolved because all suspects wore hoodies, masks, and gloves to avoid leaving evidence.
- August 2024 - Animal Cruelty Fugitive Arrested-On July 30, 2024, Crime Stoppers and partners released the names of fugitives wanted for animal cruelty to livestock animals and dogs. One suspect was wanted for neglecting a horse to the point it was severely malnourished and had the lowest body score possible. Another was wanted for kicking a dog causing it to slide several feet across concrete. Two different tipsters contacted the tip line within days of the press conference to provide the location of these fugitives. Both were arrested and are awaiting trial.
- October 2024 - UH Student Robbed-On August 27, 2024, University of Houston police officers responded to an Aggravated Robbery with a Deadly Weapon inside a dormitory. Upon arrival, officers interviewed the victim, who revealed they had been chatting on Instagram with a female. Their playful exchange led to the victim inviting her to their dorm room around 3:00 a.m. After spending some time together, the female left the room, and the victim stepped out to use the community bathroom. Upon returning, the victim was shocked to find two suspects, rummaging through their belongings. Startled, the victim dropped their cellphone, at which point both suspects brandished handguns, grabbed the phone, and fled on foot in an unknown direction. A tipster contacted Crime Stoppers and provided the names of the two men who were arrested as a result. Investigators later connected one of the suspects to a prior violent crime—the fatal shooting of a 90-year-old Navy veteran during a carjacking.
- October 2024 - Mom Tries to Sell Newborn on Facebook-In September 2024, a 21-year-old woman took to a Facebook group for prospective adoptive parents, posting an offer to place her unborn baby for adoption. As hopeful parents responded, the woman began demanding money in exchange for the child, even telling one couple that if the baby wasn't worth \$150, then "screw it." Authorities launched an investigation, and charges were filed against the suspect. She remained at large until a tipster provided her location, leading to her arrest.
- November 2024-School Restroom Assault-On October 1, 2024, two juvenile students confronted a fellow student in a school restroom. One suspect restrained the victim's arms while the other touched the victim in an inappropriate manner. The victim managed to break free and escape. Shortly after, an anonymous campus tipster provided the names of both suspects. As a result, school officials took swift action, and the suspects faced administrative disciplinary consequences.

# Honoring Safety, Healing, Justice, and Rights for Crime Victims and Survivors

Being a victim of a crime is frightening and unsettling for the millions of Americans who unfortunately experience it each year. Progress has been made in improving the rights of crime victims. Victims and survivors of homicide, sexual assault, child abuse, domestic violence and other serious offenses have transformed their victimization into a vehicle for ensuring that victims of crime receive justice, meaningful assistance and compassionate treatment.



### PROGRAM IN ACTION

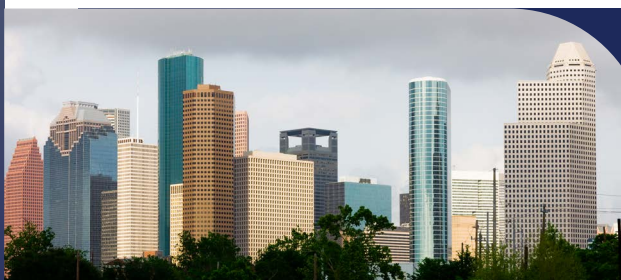
The Victim Services and Advocacy Program provides the following to crime victims and survivors:

- Advocate for crime victims through all stages of victimization.
- Assist crime victims and survivors in efforts to rebuild their lives.
- Assist in collaboration between law enforcement agencies, prosecutors, probation and parole departments, juvenile justice systems and social services.
- Accompany crime victims and survivors to Court and Parole Board hearings.
- Guide crime victims and survivors through media inquiries and speaking engagements.
- Refer crime victims and survivor to local, state-wide, and national victim assistance organizations.
- Work toward legislative improvements to enhance victims' rights and public safety.

### ADVOCACY IN ACTION

In 2021, Crime Stoppers of Houston identified a major gap in post-conviction advocacy services. To meet that need, we established our first of its kind Victim Impact Video Project which provides victims the opportunity to record their story in video format and submit that video to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles so that their story can be heard at all future parole hearings whether they are there in person or not.

**To date, we have created 47 Victim Impact Statement Videos and 8 have been used in parole hearings. In all cases they were used, parole has been denied. As the word spreads about this important project, our team has worked hard to create a scalable process.**

## KNOW YOUR RIGHTS

Do you know your rights in Texas? As a victim of violent crime in Texas, you have the following rights:

- The right to be notified of all court proceedings including cancellation and rescheduling.
- The right to receive information about the Texas Crime Victim Compensation Fund that provides financial assistance to victims of violent crimes.
- The right to have the magistrate take the safety of the victim or their family into consideration as an element in fixing the amount of bail for the accused.
- If you so request, the right to information about procedures in the criminal investigation of your case by law enforcement officials, and about general procedures in the criminal justice system, including plea bargaining, restitution, appeals and parole from the prosecutor's office.
- The right to complete a Victim Impact Statement, detailing the emotional, physical and financial impact that the crime has had on you and your family, and to have that statement considered by the judge at sentencing and by the parole board. We were able to reach 921 people statewide.

## LEGISLATIVE SUCCESSES

The Victim Services and Advocacy Program works tirelessly to fight for necessary legislative changes. Since its inception in 2018, the program has seen the following legislative successes:

- House Bill 2079 and Senate Bill 2210, also known as the 'Sir Romeo' bill, which allows families whose children are victims of attempted murder to apply for relocation expenses via the Crime Victims Compensation Program
- House Bill 1769, also known as 'Clear Alert', which allows law enforcement to send out alerts for missing adults when criminal conduct is involved
- Senate Bill 4372, also known as the Summer Camp Safety bill, which enhances the overall safety of campers and families
- Senate Bill 6, also known as the "Damon Allen Act" eliminates PR bonds for defendants charged with particular violent crimes.
- Senate Bill 402: Mandates that Texas trial courts prioritize scheduling hearings and trials for defendants charged with murder and capital murder over other criminal cases.
- Senate Bill 1004: Makes it illegal for individuals under electronic monitoring to intentionally remove, disable, or interfere with their tracking devices.

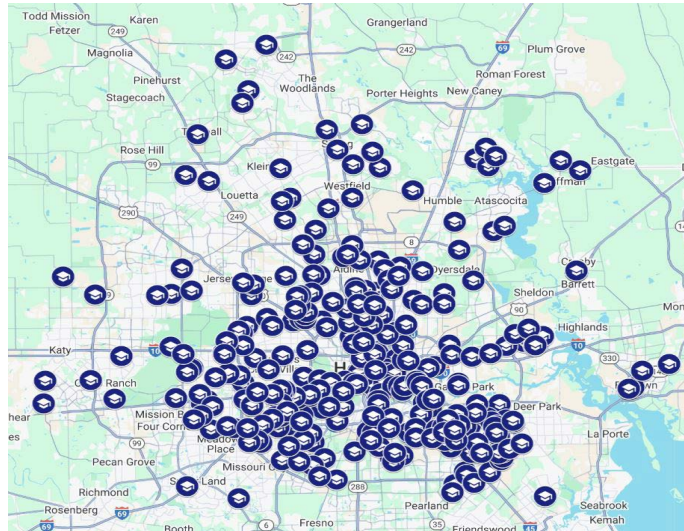

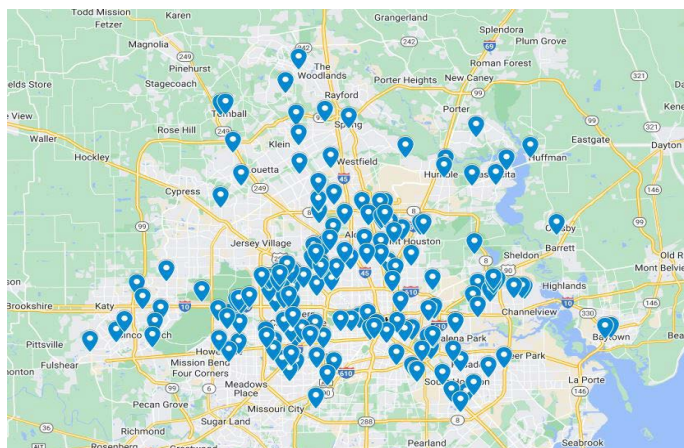

# 2017-2024 SIGNIFICANT SCHOOL CASES AND SUCCESS STORIES



## FEBRUARY 2017

**Terroristic Threat at a Local High School:** After school on February 7, 2017, a 9th Grade student told other students of his plan to place bombs in the school's cafeteria on the following day. The student went on to say that after the bombs exploded, while the students were fleeing the building, they would be shot. A tipster called Crime Stoppers on February 8th and provided that information. The tipster did not know the number of bombs the juvenile allegedly had or if the juvenile was working alone. An investigator immediately contacted a Campus Officer. The juvenile was arrested for 3rd Degree Felony Terroristic Threat and charged. No explosive devices were discovered on the school campus. The juvenile suspect was held at the Harris County Juvenile Detention Center for a period of days and then released into the custody of his parents. This plot was thwarted and the juvenile suspect was arrested due to the Crime Stoppers tip.

## MARCH 2017

**Extensive Property Damage at a Local High School:** In March 2017, a local high school contacted Crime Stoppers for assistance on a case that involved property damage of the school's track and field area. The school police felt that the suspect was a student and asked for a Crime Stoppers flyer offering a reward for the case to be posted around the campus. Shortly after the flyers were posted an anonymous student tipster called the tip line and provided the name of the student suspect as well as a video of the suspect using a tractor to destroy school property. The estimated damages to the field and other property was over \$18,000. The suspect was arrested on April 11, 2017 as a result of the tip provided.

## OCTOBER 2017

**9mm at a Local High School:** On October 18, 2017, at 10:56 a.m., a call came into the tip line regarding a social media conversation about a student at a local high school who had a gun in the waist band of his pants. Crime Stoppers notified the school resource officer of the student that had a weapon in the classroom. The resource officer and the assistant principal located the student in the classroom and instructed him to exit the class. After searching the student, no gun was located. The assistant principal instructed the remaining students to step out of the classroom to complete a thorough search for a weapon. A couple of rows over from where suspect was sitting, another student's back pack was located that contained a black Glock 17 (9) millimeter automatic weapon. The school resource officer took possession of the weapon and ensured it was secured. As a direct result of the student tipster, charges of possession of prohibited weapon in a weapon free zone were filed on the student that actually had the gun.

## FEBRUARY 2018

**Self-Harm by a Local High School Student:** On February 27, 2018, a tipster sent a message through the Mobile Crime Stoppers App providing information on a student who cut her herself and believed she was in danger of causing additional harm to herself. The tipster identified where the female cut herself and that she is a 9th grader at a local High School. The Crime Stoppers investigator contacted the Assistant Principle and advised a student may be harming herself by cutting and suggested she and the school nurse contact the student. The Assistant Principle spoke to the student and verified that she had indeed cut herself on the arms. This occurred due to a break up with her boyfriend. The Assistant Principle reached out to the mother and was able to provide her with some literature and resources for counseling. Based on the tip, the students file will be noted that she is a possible harm to herself and close attention will be paid to her by teachers and counselors. The tipster is receiving a Crime Stoppers reward for providing information that led to this student being identified and helped.



## **AUGUST 2018**

**School Threat at a Local High School:** In August 2018, Crime Stoppers of Houston received a tip through the mobile app regarding a threat against a local school. The tipster said that another student was planning to shoot people the following Monday. Crime Stoppers quickly notified the school and law enforcement. When questioned the student suspect denied the allegations but did admit to speaking with two friends about guns. The friends asked the suspect if he wanted to shoot anyone to which he answered no. He did admit that he had access to guns at home but that they are locked in a safe. The suspect also said that he was sad from being bullied and made fun of about his stutter. School officials notified the suspects parents and gave the student an administrative discipline.

**Inappropriate Pictures at a Local High School:** On August 24th, 2018, Crime Stoppers of Houston received a tip through the website regarding inappropriate pictures of a female student that were being shared. The tipster provided the name of a male student that posted and texted the pictures. Crime Stoppers contacted the school administrators who were able to determine that one of the suspects did in fact have pictures of a female student and posted them on a social media site. As a result of the tip, the male student received an administrative discipline.

## **FEBRUARY 2019**

**Attempted Suicide of a Local High School Student:** A student tipster called the tip line in February 2019 reporting they were worried that a friend might commit suicide. The student in question had been cutting their arms and had attempted to kill themselves several times in the past and recently cut their wrists to the point of passing out from blood loss. The tipster was very worried because the student was talking a lot about suicide that day and they were afraid he/she would actually go through with it. The school counselor was notified and assessed the student and a safety plan was put in place for the student and their family.

## **APRIL 2019**

**Self-Harm at a Local Junior High:** A mobile app tip was received in April 2019 regarding a student that had made threats to commit suicide. The tipster reported that the student had a traumatic experience a few years prior and "just doesn't want to deal with it anymore". The student was also felt extreme stress around school, being a good role model and friend. School counselors were notified and reported back that on a threat scale of 1-10 the student was at an 8. As a result of this tip, the student and their parents received administrative support.

## **AUGUST 2019**

**Threats at a Local High School:** In August 2019 two students got into a fight at a local high school. The aggressor received a three-day suspension and proceeded to make very explicit threats against the other student on social media. An anonymous tipster utilized the Crime Stoppers mobile app to report the threats. School officials were notified immediately and steps were taken to protect the victim.

## **JANUARY 2020**

A Houston Area High School had a weapon related fatality and had our Deputy Director speak on the Tip Line to educate on what to do in the event of knowing about a situation that may occur or has occurred. As well as how to use the mobile app or call the tip line number, what the process looks like and how to potentially receive a cash reward.

## **JANUARY 2021**

A Houston Area High school had a situation in the fall semester surrounding explicit content and relational safety. After this situation occurred the counselor reached out to the Safe School Institute and had us present to their th-12th grade students on Teen Dating Violence to bring awareness around the topic but also laws, consequences and long term affects.





## APRIL 2021

A Fort Bend Area Middle School had us out to present on Cyber Safety. In between presentations, the education specialist was approached and told that after they had finished with the 6th grade and 7th grade presentation, there had been 4 disclosures about bullying and theft of student items on campus that they were able to solve and return the items back to the owner.

## OCTOBER 2021

A Houston Area Elementary School had us out to present on Bullying Prevention. The counselor then followed up with the education specialist who presented and made them aware of a bullying and harassment situation regarding a group of students in one of the grades. She reached out to make sure that she was following the proper protocol of reporting the bullying / harassment situation. This then lead the Safe School Institute to create Educator Flow charts to assists educators and professional safe in the school system when handling certain situations and what potential next steps are.

## JANUARY 2022

The Safe School Institute received numerous requests from school counselors across the Houston area for resources specific to preventing student vaping. To address this growing trend, the team created a vaping specific student presentation, post-presentation assessments, and held virtual webinars (SAVE Webinars) designed for school educators, admin, school staff, and other Crime Stoppers organization across the state to best empower schools across Texas.

## JANUARY 2022

A Harris County Charter School had an incident with their 11th grade students and reached out to the Safe School Institute to request the Teen Dating and Sexual Misconduct presentation. We spoke to their 11th graders about the legal ramifications of teen dating violence and sexual misconduct. Additionally, we talked about red flags, consequences and how to advocate for oneself and others. As a preventative measure, we also spoke to lower grades that day as well, as a form of prevention on this topic.

## APRIL 2022

A Fort Bend area Middle School invited us to talk to 6th, 7th, and 8th grade students about cyber safety. During a discussion about the Tip Line, the campus Safety Resource Officer reiterated the use and importance of the Tip Line. Shortly after that presentation, the principal told our team that several 6th graders reported information they had about incidents that had occurred recently. Administration was able to recover stolen goods and intervene in a bullying situation.

## NOVEMBER 2022

A Montgomery County Middle School invited Crime Stoppers out to talk about Cyber Safety with their 6th and 7th graders. After one of the presentations, a group of students came up to the presenter and shared their concerns about a new app they had been using called "GAS". The students shared that the app was asked for personal information like full name, school, and grade. Our presentation raised concerns about the app among the students, so they asked our team for advice on what to do. The presenter was able to help them figure out the safe thing to do, as well as provide school staff with some information to help support the students.







2023

The Safe School Institute team was invited to present on teen dating violence and sexual misconduct at a high school in Baytown, Texas. After the presentation, a student personally thanked our staff presenter and shared they had recently had a family member struggle with dating violence in a relationship. The student empathized with how vital the conversation points are to young adults and validated the red flag behaviors highlighted in the presentation compared to what her family member had experienced.

A few days after providing a virtual presentation on cyber safety to teen students at a local school in Houston, Texas, a student at the campus reached out via email to share that they were being bullied by a fellow student and were concerned for their wellbeing. The Safe School Institute team responded to the student and applauded them for their courage, shared the incident with the counselor on campus, and connected this student to the resources and support they needed.

At the conclusion of a human trafficking presentation at a local middle school, our team received positive feedback from the students on the Light 2024 video done by our partners at Goya Foods. The students really like it and it has really made an impact on how they see human trafficking, specifically how it could happen to a student just like them.

After facilitating a presentation on bullying prevention to 5th graders at an elementary school in San Antonio, Texas, the counselor informed our team that students had improved their treatment of one another. Students also took the “on Wednesdays we wear pink” from Mean Girls and made it into a day where they did intentional acts of kindness. A parent even got involved and made shirts for the entire 5th grade cohort.

Following a presentation in Seguin, Texas, a student came forward asking our education specialist for more information about the Tip Line, disclosing that they were going to call the Tip Line regarding dating violence that was occurring to her friend.

Following a presentation on teen dating violence and human trafficking prevention at an early college preparatory school, a student came forward, disclosing concerns about an online relationship she had been engaging in. The counselor was able to offer ongoing support after her disclosure.





## 2024

One of our staff members presented the Be Nice (Mental Health) curriculum at a middle school in Hays County, TX, and was approached by a student confided in them about having suicidal thoughts but was afraid to speak to the school counselor or her parents. Our staff member immediately connected with the counselor, who met with the student, facilitated a meeting with her parents, and arranged for free on-site counseling through a school-supported mental health program.

At a middle school in Travis County, TX, where our team presented the DLF Bullying Prevention curriculum, the principal later shared that bullying incident reports had significantly increased after the presentation—showing that students felt more empowered to speak up.

Following a presentation on substance use and vaping prevention at an alternative campus in San Antonio, TX, several students sought support from their counselors for resources on sobriety. The school counselor reached out to our team, and we provided a list of local resources for students and their families.

Immediately after a teen dating safety and sexual misconduct presentation in San Antonio, TX, one of our staff members was approached by a middle school student who disclosed that she had experienced abuse but was afraid to tell anyone. With the counselor's support, she was able to confide in her parents and begin therapy. During a later visit, she shared that she had started opening up to her therapist.

At a middle school in San Antonio, TX, after a vaping prevention presentation, a student shared with our staff that she was coping with stress through self-harm but was scared for her parents to find out. With help from school counselors, her family was involved in providing emotional support.

Once our team finished a teen dating violence (TDV) presentation at a school in Grayson County, TX, a student approached our staff seeking advice on his relationship. He shared that he didn't want his relationship to be abusive like his parents' before their divorce and asked for communication tips.

Following a vaping prevention presentation in Cedar Hill, TX, a student asked a staff member for permission to take a picture of a slide comparing vape use to cigarette packs. They wanted to share it with a friend at another campus to raise awareness about the health risks of vaping.

After a substance abuse presentation at a campus in Princeton, TX, a student returned an hour later with a counselor, seeking guidance on quitting vaping. The student wanted accountability and resources for healthy activities to stay focused and on track.

One of our Houston Education Specialists presented at a local elementary school for 3rd and 4th graders. The school contact requested a follow-up discussion regarding all of our services and curriculum offerings. As a starting point, the elementary school requested 800 child ID Kits for the parents. They appreciated that Crime Stoppers provided a resource that ensured peace of mind for families in case of an emergency.

A charter school we have worked with yearly, asked us to come do a tipline presentation in September 2024. The students showed great enthusiasm in regards to how to report, and asked a plethora of questions. In December of 2024, 2 short months after visiting their campus – we received a high-level tip from their campus that helped a student who was assaulted in the bathroom. Thankful someone was brave enough to utilize the tip line to report this serious situation.

## STATEWIDE TRAININGS

### BACKGROUND

On May 30, 2018, Governor Greg Abbott unveiled his multifaceted “School and Firearm Safety Action Plan” in response to the Santa Fe High School shooting that occurred on May 18, 2018. His Action Plan includes expanding campus Crime Stoppers programs statewide. As the largest Crime Stoppers organization in the country, the Texas Criminal Justice Division asked Crime Stoppers of Houston to roll out our Safe School Program to as many Crime Stoppers organizations across the state – reaching approximately 1,800 school districts.

In response, we are committed to sharing our program, training stakeholders, developing curriculum, and engaging the community so that every Crime Stoppers organization operating within the State of Texas can offer their local schools and their entire community the same life-saving tools and resources we have here.



In 2018, we held our first quarterly training at our headquarters, followed by 6 more in-person quarterly trainings through February 2020. However, with the onset of COVID 19, we moved our trainings to a virtual platform for the remainder of 2020 through present. We’ve reached 291 Crime Stoppers groups/affiliates within Texas, 31 Crime Stoppers groups/affiliates from around the USA and internationally, and will continue to host quarterly trainings moving forward.





We began preparing to roll out this initiative by engaging with each organization, over a 4-week period in June 2018, to determine their interest in replicating our Safe School Program in their area.

- 173 Crime Stoppers organizations and ISDs statewide responded to our extensive survey with the following outcome:
- 143 organizations or 88.27% are requesting a copy of our entire Safe School Program
- 123 organizations or 77.85% are ready to send a representative to Houston immediately for training
- 120 organizations or 82.76% are asking for our branding guidelines to make the statewide look of Crime Stoppers more cohesive

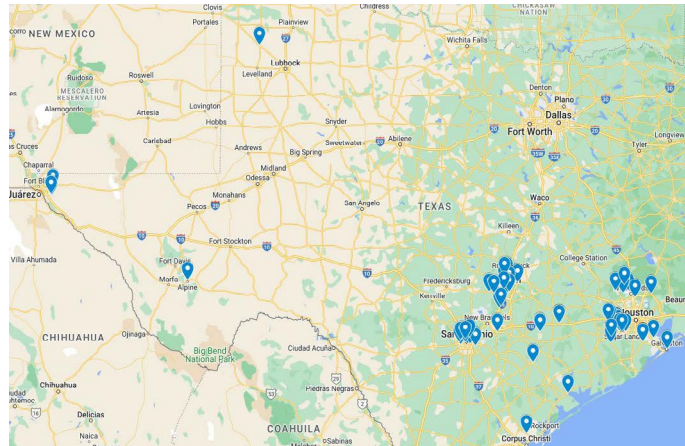

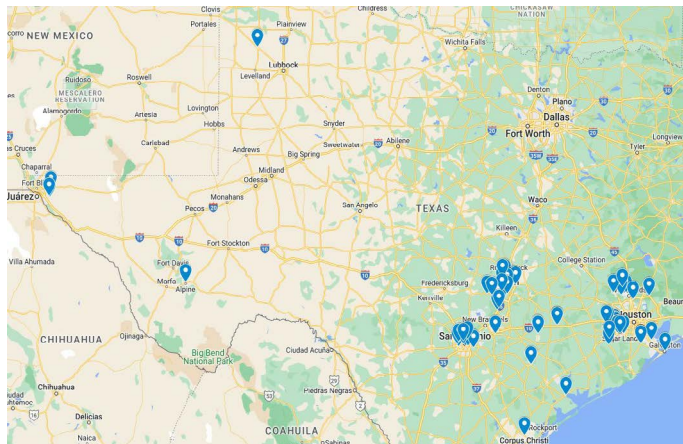
