

Safe School Institute

The Safe School Institute is a FREE year-round one-stop center for all aspects of school safety. It works to keep schools safe by creating a proactive dialogue with students, parents, school staff and law enforcement about personal and school safety and by providing students with a safe and anonymous way to report crime and violations of the student code of conduct on campus.

Statewide Expansion

Through our Statewide Expansion efforts, our team strives to be a resource and a solution for school safety education. We currently offer the following to help all school communities across the state of Texas:

- **Safe School Presentations across Texas (outside of Harris County):** In 2023, we expanded our statewide team creating a robust team of presenters across the State.
- **Statewide Trainings:** In response to the Santa Fe High School shooting in 2018, Governor Greg Abbott asked CSOH to roll our Safe School Program to as many Crime Stoppers organizations across the state – reaching approximately 1,800 school districts.
- **S.A.V.E. Webinars:** In partnership with the Texas Education Agency (TEA), we created our S.A.V.E. to provide resources for teachers, school staff/administration and school-based law enforcement.

Victim Services and Advocacy Program

The Victim Services and Advocacy Program promotes safety, healing, justice and rights for crime victims and survivors. It is designed to act as an advocate on all stages of victimization and ensure crime victims and survivors have a voice in our criminal justice system.

In 2021, Crime Stoppers of Houston identified a major gap in post-conviction advocacy services. To meet that need, we established our first of its kind Victim Impact Video Project which provides victims the opportunity to record their story in video format and submit that video to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles so that their story can be heard at all future parole hearings whether they are there in person or not.

To date, we have created 56 Victim Impact Statement Videos and 8 have been used in parole hearings. In all cases they were used, parole has been denied. As the word spreads about this important project, our team has worked hard to create a scalable process.

The Glenda Gordy Research Center

In 2022, we launched The Glenda Gordy Research Center to give Houstonians a cohesive and clear view of the criminal justice system here in Harris County, In our quest to be a solution focused organization, we are committed to providing Houstonians with accurate, accessible crime data. 



OPENED 2017

In January 2017, Crime Stoppers of Houston opened the doors to its first-ever home, The Dave Ward Building, Crime Stoppers of Houston, providing the answer to all things public safety and crime prevention and standing as the hub for all crime trends, tips and tactics.

The facility houses a community center where citizens, non-profits, students and faculty, law enforcement agencies and community partners convene for educational purposes, a victim's family room for controlled media interviews and law enforcement case meetings, a state-of-the-art press conference room, program offices that deliver direct crime prevention services to the community, and a Law Enforcement Detail Office to house the Tip Line Program.



MEMORIAL GARDEN

The first Harris County Officers Memorial Garden, dedicated in tribute to the fallen Peace Officers of Harris County opened in May 2017. Crime Stoppers of Houston is honored that this sacred place forever stands with Crime Stoppers Building. HOW IT WORKS

The Tip Line offers cash rewards to anonymous citizens who provide tips to help solve unsolved crimes and locate wanted fugitives in the Greater Houston Area. Crime Stoppers may pay a cash reward of up to \$5,000 on all felony crimes that happen in the Greater Houston/Harris County area. The only requirement is you must report your tip directly to Crime Stoppers by calling (713) 222-TIPS (8477), going online to crime-stoppers.org or by using the Crime Stoppers mobile app.

Things You Should Know

Crime Stoppers may pay a **cash reward of up to \$5,000 on all felony crimes** that happen in the Greater Houston/Harris County area. Here are things you should know about our Tip Line:

- To be eligible for a cash reward, you must report your tip directly to Crime Stoppers of Houston.
- Crime Stoppers will never ask you for your name, phone number, address, or any other information that could identify you. We do not record phone calls or have caller ID. No one will know you called us unless you tell them.
- Once you give us your tip, you will be given a code number. This is the only way Crime Stoppers can identify you. Crime Stoppers cannot call you with the status because we don't ask for your phone number. You need to remember this number and provide it when you call back to check the status of your tip.
- When you call back with your code number we will let you know if your tip helped law enforcement arrest or charge a felony suspect/fugitive. If it did, you may be eligible for a cash reward and will give you instructions on how to retrieve your cash reward. You will not be asked to show any ID.

2025 Tip Line Successes

JANUARY

Murder Fugitive Back Behind Bars: On September 26, 2024, Crime Stoppers held a press conference announcing an increased reward for information related to the August 2021 murder of U.S. Air Force member Albert Castillo Jr. Witnesses reported the victim and suspect had been involved in a dispute before the suspect was seen driving down the street and firing multiple shots from an AR-style rifle. The suspect was charged and later released on bond while awaiting trial. Just days before the trial was set to begin, he removed his ankle monitor and fled. A tip provided critical information that allowed authorities to locate and arrest the suspect, who is now back in custody awaiting trial.

Two Murders Solved by One Tip: On September 4, 2024, the suspect and several individuals were drinking beer on a bench when the victim exited their apartment and began walking to a nearby store. The suspect joined the victim on the sidewalk and shot him in the back of the head. After the victim fell, the suspect stood over him and fired multiple additional shots before taking the victim's cellphone and walking away. Investigators later learned the same suspect had shot and killed another individual just one block away months earlier. An anonymous tip provided enough information for law enforcement to arrest the suspect, who is now in jail.

FEBRUARY

University Sexual Assault Suspect Arrested Within Hours: On February 18, 2025, a press conference was held requesting the public's assistance in locating a suspect wanted for aggravated sexual assault. The assault occurred inside a university parking garage, where the suspect attacked the victim at knifepoint before robbing them. Although the suspect had initially been arrested, he was mistakenly released. Within three hours of the press conference, multiple tips were received, leading to the suspect's swift re-arrest.

Human Trafficking Fugitive Arrested: Crime Stoppers announced an increased reward for information leading to the arrest of a fugitive wanted for human trafficking. The suspect had been out on bond during trial proceedings but fled just days before the case was handed to the jury. Despite his absence, the jury found him guilty and sentenced him to 75 years in prison. Nearly two years later, a tip revealed the fugitive was at a local hospital using an assumed name. Authorities acted immediately and arrested the suspect, ensuring he would finally serve his sentence.

Student Bomb Plot Thwarted: In late February 2025, information was received regarding a concealed hole containing materials used to construct explosive devices. The tip further revealed the suspect intended to use a bomb to target another student. Authorities immediately responded, deploying the bomb squad to analyze the materials and secure the area. Due to the rapid response, a potential tragedy was prevented, and the suspect faced immediate disciplinary action.

MARCH

One Tip Leads to 11 Solved Cases: An anonymous tip submitted through the Crime Stoppers mobile app led to the arrest of a fugitive wanted in 11 cases out of New Mexico. The suspect had evaded law enforcement for six years while facing charges including sexual exploitation of a juvenile, extortion to engage in sexual activity with a juvenile, and the manufacturing, possession, and distribution of child sexual abuse material. The tip provided the information needed to locate and apprehend the suspect, bringing justice to multiple victims.

High School Shooting Suspect Identified: On February 28, 2025, just before 3 p.m., Pasadena detectives responded to a shooting in a parking lot near a local high school. One student was shot in the chest, suffering a collapsed lung and broken rib, while another student was shot in the arm. Surveillance footage showed a chaotic fight involving juveniles and adults before a suspect fired three rounds and fled in a maroon Chevrolet Silverado. A tip submitted through the Crime Stoppers mobile app led to the identification and arrest of the gunman.

APRIL

Fugitive Wanted for Infant's Death Captured: A tip provided Crime Stoppers with information regarding a fugitive wanted out of Pennsylvania for the death of his partner's four-month-old child. The tip included the suspect's location in Houston, Texas. The information was forwarded to the Gulf Coast Violent Offender Task Force, which confirmed the suspect's arrest. The fugitive is now in custody and facing justice for the infant's death.

Tip Prevents Potential School Threat: A tip submitted through the Crime Stoppers website identified a juvenile student making alarming threats on social media. On March 24, 2025, the student posted claims about possessing materials to build an explosive device, referred to himself as “smarter than Oppenheimer,” and threatened to use the device if a female student refused to marry him. School officials confirmed the student was identified and expelled for violating the school’s Code of Conduct, potentially preventing a serious incident.

MAY

Teen Arrested in Violent Purse Snatching: On December 17, 2024, two teens ambushed a woman in downtown Houston, violently snatching her purse and repeatedly punching her as she tried to hold on. Surveillance footage captured the attack. Months later, an anonymous tip led to the arrest of one of the juveniles involved.

JUNE

Parking Dispute Turns Violent: On June 7, 2025, a parking dispute inside a shopping center garage escalated when one driver opened fire on another vehicle. Although the victim escaped without injury, multiple bullets struck the vehicle, causing approximately \$3,000 in damage. A tip led to the identification and arrest of the shooter.

Metro Bus Murder Suspect Captured: In May 2025, an altercation on a Metro bus escalated when the suspect struck the victim with a firearm, briefly walked away, then returned and fatally shot him. Crime Stoppers received two tips—one identifying the suspect and another providing his location—leading to his arrest without incident.

JULY

Juvenile Human Trafficking Victim Rescued: A tip submitted through the Crime Stoppers mobile app led investigators to a suspect connected to a 2023 murder and multiple human trafficking cases. During the investigation, detectives discovered a juvenile victim and several adults who reported being threatened with extreme violence if they did not engage in prostitution. The juvenile was rescued, and all suspects were taken into custody.

AUGUST

Stolen Firearm Removed From High School Campus: A student submitted a tip through the Crime Stoppers mobile app reporting a classmate with a gun on campus. Officers located a 17-year-old suspect in possession of a loaded 9mm Glock, later confirmed to be stolen.

NOVEMBER

Animal Cruelty Case Resolved: A tip led deputies to a residence where two dogs were found living in severe neglect, surrounded by feces accumulated over months. The animals were seized under a warrant, and citations were issued.

Chop Shop Operation Shut Down: A tip led investigators to a chop shop operation where ten stolen vehicles were recovered, including pickup trucks and high-value vehicles. The location was being used to dismantle vehicles for parts, ending a major criminal operation.

DECEMBER

Reckless Assault Involving Children Ends in Arrest: During a custody exchange on October 18, 2025, a suspect endangered three children by driving recklessly while they were unsecured and later struck the complainant with a vehicle. A tip provided the information needed to arrest the suspect.

SAFE COMMUNITY INSTITUTE

The Safe Community Institute (SCI) is a one stop shop for all things public safety and crime prevention. The Institute offers community members one centralized location for all crime-related statistical data, resources, prevention education, public safety awareness content, and victim services. Crime Stoppers of Houston's Safe Community Program, Victim Services Program, The Balanced Voice Podcast, and all-new Glenda Gordy Research Center are all housed under the Safe Community Institute which is built on four pillars:



Seek to understand the needs of all community members through listening and engaging



Be a vessel for proactive dialogue with the purpose of identifying needed change and providing tangible solutions to community needs



Be a reliable source for crime data and statistical research that is easily digestible for all community members

HONORING SAFETY, HEALING, JUSTICE, AND RIGHTS FOR CRIME VICTIMS AND SURVIVORS

Being a victim of a crime is frightening and unsettling for the millions of Americans who unfortunately experience it each year. Progress has been made in improving the rights of crime victims. Victims and survivors of homicide, sexual assault, child abuse, domestic violence and other serious offenses have transformed their victimization into a vehicle for ensuring that victims of crime receive justice, meaningful assistance and compassionate treatment.

PROGRAM IN ACTION

The Victim Services and Advocacy Program provides the following to crime victims and survivors:

- Advocate for crime victims through all stages of victimization.
- Assist crime victims and survivors in efforts to rebuild their lives.
- Assist in collaboration between law enforcement agencies, prosecutors, probation and parole departments, juvenile justice systems and social services.
- Accompany crime victims and survivors to Court and Parole Board hearings.
- Guide crime victims and survivors through media inquiries and speaking engagements.
- Refer crime victims and survivors to local, statewide, and national victim assistance organizations.
- Work toward legislative improvements to enhance victims' rights and public safety. **13 Legislative Successes** since Inception.



ADVOCACY IN ACTION

In 2021, Crime Stoppers of Houston identified a major gap in post-conviction advocacy services. To meet that need, we established our first of its kind Victim Impact Video Project which provides victims the opportunity to record their story in video format and submit that video to the Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles so that their story can be heard at all future parole hearings whether they are there in person or not.

To date, we have created 56 Victim Impact Statement Videos and 10 have been used in parole hearings. In all cases they were used, parole has been denied. As the word spreads about this important project, our team has worked hard to create a scalable process.

2017–2025 Significant School Cases



2017

Terroristic Threat at a Local High School: After school, a 9th Grade student told other students of his plan to place bombs in the school's cafeteria on the following day. The student went on to say that after the bombs exploded, while the students were fleeing the building, they would be shot. A tipster called Crime Stoppers and provided that information. An investigator immediately contacted a Campus Officer. The juvenile was arrested for 3rd Degree Felony Terroristic Threat and charged. No explosive devices were discovered on the school campus. The juvenile suspect was held at the Harris County Juvenile Detention Center for a period of days and then released into the custody of his parents. This plot was thwarted and the juvenile suspect was arrested due to the Crime Stoppers tip.

Firearm on Campus: A call came into the tip line regarding a social media conversation about a student at a local high school who had a gun in the waist band of his pants. Crime Stoppers notified the school resource officer of the student that had a weapon in the classroom. The resource officer and the assistant principle located the student in the classroom and instructed him to exit the class. After searching the student, no gun was located. The assistant principal instructed the remaining students to step out of the classroom to complete a thorough search for a weapon. A couple of rows over from where suspect was sitting, another student's back pack was located that contained a black Glock 17 (9) millimeter. The school resource officer took possession of the weapon and ensured it was secured. As a direct result of the student tipster, charges of possession of prohibited weapon in a weapon free zone were filed on the student that actually had the gun.

2018

Inappropriate Pictures at a Local High School: In 2018, Crime Stoppers of Houston received a tip through the website regarding inappropriate pictures of a female student that were being shared. The tipster provided the name of a male student that posted and texted the pictures. Crime Stoppers contacted the school administrators who were able to determine that one of the suspects did in fact have pictures of a female student and posted them on a social media site. As a result of the tip, the male student received an administrative discipline.

2019

Attempted Suicide of a Local High School Student: A student tipster called the tip line in 2019 reporting they were worried that a friend might commit suicide. The student in question had been cutting their arms and had attempted to kill themselves several times in the past and recently cut their wrists to the point of passing out from blood loss. The tipster was very worried because the student was talking a lot about suicide that day and they were afraid he/she would actually go through with it. The school counselor was notified and assessed the student and a safety plan was put in place for the student and their family.

2020

Requested Tip Line Presentation: A Houston Area High School had a weapon related fatality and had our Deputy Director speak on the Tip Line to educate on what to do in the event of knowing about a situation that may occur or has occurred. As well as how to use the mobile app or call the tip line number, what the process looks like and how to potentially receive a cash reward.

2021

Bullying at Local Elementary School: A Houston Area Elementary School had us out to present on Bullying Prevention. The counselor then followed up with the education specialist who presented and made them aware of a bullying and harassment situation regarding a group of students. She reached out to make sure that she was following the proper protocol of reporting the bullying/harassment situation. This then led the Safe School Institute to create Educator Flow charts to assist educators and professional staff in the school system when handling certain situations and what potential next steps are.

2022

Increase in Vaping Presentation Requests: The Safe School Institute received numerous requests from school counselors across the Houston area for resources specific to preventing student vaping. To address this growing trend, the team created a vaping specific student presentation, post-presentation assessments, and held virtual webinars (SAVE Webinars) designed for school educators, admin, school staff, and other Crime Stoppers organization across the state to best empower schools across Texas.

2023

Bullying Prevention Success: After facilitating a presentation on bullying prevention to 5th graders at an elementary school in San Antonio, Texas, the counselor informed our team that students had improved their treatment of one another. Students also took the “on Wednesdays we wear pink” from Mean Girls and made it into a day where they did intentional acts of kindness. A parent even got involved and made shirts for the entire 5th grade cohort.

Dangerous Online Relationship for Local Student: Following a presentation on teen dating violence and human trafficking prevention at an early college preparatory school, a student came forward, disclosing concerns about an online relationship she had been engaging in. The counselor was able to offer ongoing support after her disclosure.

2024

Substance Abuse at Texas School: Following a presentation on substance use and vaping prevention at an alternative campus in San Antonio, TX, several students sought support from their counselors for resources on sobriety. The school counselor reached out to our team, and we provided a list of local resources for students and their families.

Middle Schooler in Abusive Relationship: Immediately after a teen dating safety and sexual misconduct presentation in San Antonio, TX, one of our staff members was approached by a middle school student who disclosed that she had experienced abuse but was afraid to tell anyone. With the counselor’s support, she was able to confide in her parents and begin therapy. During a later visit, she shared that she had started opening up to her therapist.

2025

Inappropriate Pictures at a Local Middle School: Following a presentation on Cyber Safety and AI Awareness at a middle school, a student recognized a situation involving a friend who had created an online profile that was being used inappropriately. Concerned about potential legal consequences, the student sought guidance. Our Safe School Director worked with the student to connect with the school counselor, and together they encouraged the prompt removal of the profile - helping prevent further harm and potential repercussions.

The John M. O'Quinn Foundation 'Million for Million' Initiative

In January 2025, Crime Stoppers of Houston launched the yearlong, statewide John M. O'Quinn Foundation 'Million for Million' Initiative - an ambitious effort designed to equip one million students and families across Texas with critical, life-saving safety resources, all while maintaining a cost of just \$1 per child.

Through strategic partnerships, innovative programming, and an unwavering commitment to accessibility, the initiative not only met its goal - it surpassed it, reaching more than one million students and families statewide. This milestone demonstrated that scalable, high-impact safety education is possible when community investment, efficiency, and mission-driven leadership align.





BACKGROUND

On May 30, 2018, Governor Greg Abbott unveiled his multifaceted “School and Firearm Safety Action Plan” in response to the Santa Fe High School shooting that occurred on May 18, 2018. His Action Plan includes expanding campus Crime Stoppers programs statewide. As the largest Crime Stoppers organization in the country, the Texas Criminal Justice Division asked Crime Stoppers of Houston to roll out our Safe School Program to as many Crime Stoppers organizations across the state – reaching approximately 1,800 school districts.

In response, we are committed to sharing our program, training stakeholders, developing curriculum, and engaging the community so that every Crime Stoppers organization operating within the State of Texas can offer their local schools and their entire community the same life-saving tools and resources we have here.



In 2018, we held our first quarterly training at our headquarters, followed by 6 more in-person quarterly trainings through February 2020. However, with the onset of COVID 19, we moved our trainings to a virtual platform for the remainder of 2020 through present.



We began preparing to roll out this initiative by engaging with each organization, over a 4-week period in June 2018, to determine their interest in replicating our Safe School Program in their area.

Safe School Presentations Accross Texas (Outside of Harris County)

2023

In 2023, the Safe School Institute expanded its statewide team to ensure that every student, educator, law enforcement officer, and parent had free access to preventative education. 
This team is responsible for facilitating presentation requests outside of the Greater Houston Area and building relationships with school campuses and districts across major cities and small towns.
